### LAKE SIMCOE DEER HAZARD ON HIGHWAYS

Herds of deer roaming four counties south and west of Lake Simcoe are creating highway hazards, J. S. Ellis, Ontario inspector of fish and wildlife said Saturday. Farmers complain the animals are damaging crops. Motorists and dogs have killed about 40 so far this year.

### MARKHAM BUILDING NEAR QUARTER MILLION IN APRIL

Building in Markham Township during the month of April amounted to \$244,050. This amount included 26 new homes, largest of which was a permit for \$15,000 for a new dwelling to be erected for R. Knox-Leet at Ringwood where the house was destroyed by fire last year.

## Comments by Judge Not Pleasing to Stouffville and District

"They can go to the suburbs," said Judge T. H. Barton in referring to the holding up of any more applications for junk yards in Toronto. "Toronto is getting saturated with salvage yards." Mayor Allan Lamport declared recently to the Toronto Police Commission.

From a local point of view the reply is "keep your junk yards, we don't want them." Stouffville, Markham Township and Whitechurch Township are continually plagued by those who wish to open up junk and wrecking yards and there is nothing to prevent these being established without the passing of a bylaw. The only other restriction which in some instances can be enforced is the case of a junk yard creating a fire hazard or a public nuisance. From a municipal point of view junk yards are certainly not wanted, and councils in all local municipalities are continually bombarded by citizens objecting to these disorderly premises being opened up next to them.

In Toronto it is said that the high price offered for salvage is bringing a flood of applications to open junk yards.

In some instances restrictions placed on such yards requires a high board fence around the premises to hide its unsightly appearance from the public and prevent a municipal eyesore.

## EDITOR'S MAIL

REPORT TO MARKHAM TOWNSHIP TAXPAYERS

You will recall two weeks ago the writer published a report received from the Township Auditors, from which I quote as follows: "We believe the whole system of accounting and recording and filing should be changed and overhauled. The filing system is in a deplorable state. We are prepared to change the system, but hesitate to do so without assurance that the staff are capable of carrying on when a different system is installed. The municipality, we believe, should have a capable accountant, and unless such a person is available there might be more confusion than there is now."

At the time of publishing this report, I asked if the council was prepared to do anything about this matter. Well taxpayers, apparently council has the answer. At the regular meeting of May 5th, Deputy-Reeve A. E. James moved the following resolution, seconded

by Councillor Charles Hooper: "That the Township of Markham investigate the hiring of a different Auditor?" The result of this vote was as follows: FOR—Reeve Timbers, Deputy-Reeve A. James, Councillor Hooper, Councillor A. Lennie. AGAINST—Councillor A. LeMasurier.

Is it because the auditors gave such a truthful and honest report of the conditions existing in our office that council passed this resolution? If, in the business world a company receives such a damaging report, do they close their eyes and say it can't happen here and change their auditor, or do they do a bit of house cleaning? I believe the auditor should be complimented on having the courage and conviction to bring to the attention of the public the condition which he found existed. I find, on checking, that this firm of auditors specializes in auditing other Townships' books, and know whereof they speak.

At this same meeting, the Reeve announced that we are going to have more "closed" meetings where the public will not be permitted. On asking the reason why I received no satisfactory answer. Mr. Taxpayer, what goes here? Alf. LeMasurier

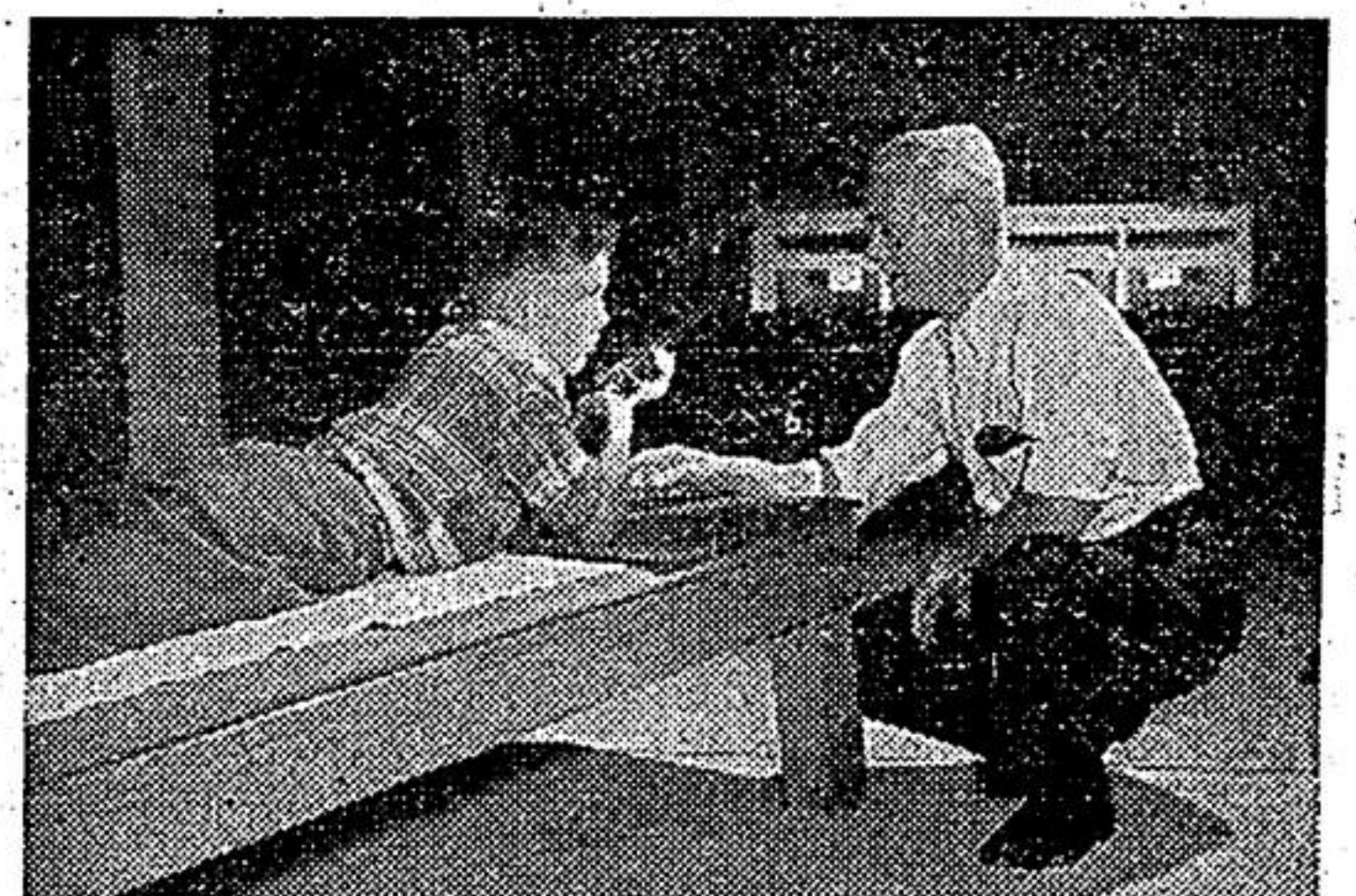

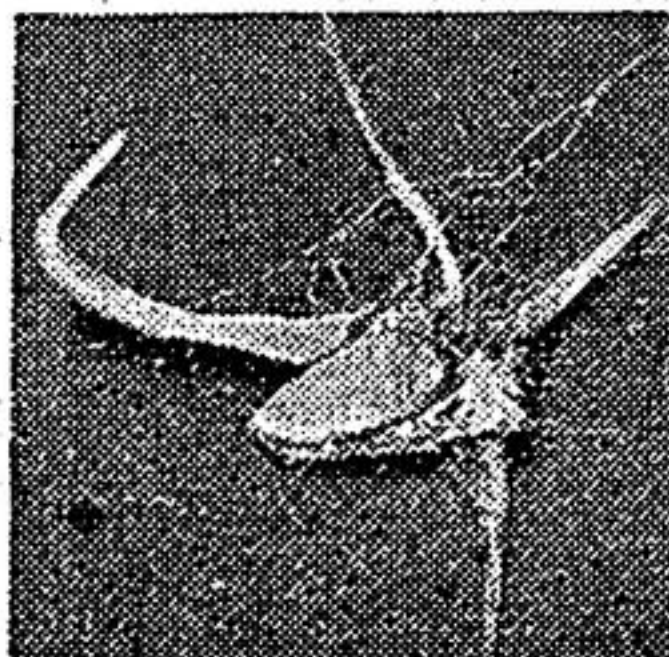
