Local Visitor Sees Annual Tulip Festival in Holland (Glenn Ratcliff)

London, W.I. Let's start with arrival in Scotland after Easter Monday day trip from London aboard the Royal Scot. The holiday weather was grand in Britain, and the people took full advantage of it, getting out in the country to enjoy this nice spring weather - summer weather they called it here. Some hardy youths even made use of the country swimming holes.

Glasgow with its grey stone buildings, and being an industrial city with a fair lot of smoke, presents rather a dull, drab appearance. However, the spring daffodils blooming throughout the parks and woodlands did much to brighten it. My host and hostess, Mr. Macgregor's sister and her husband, had planned that I should see as much of Scotland as possible in so short a time, with the result that not much time was spent in Glasgow itself. The weather remained beautiful and spring-like throughout the time spent in Britain. If you mention to a Britisher how nice the weather is, the inevitable reply seems to be, "We'll pay up for this," or "This can't last." "It will be raining to-morrow." Perhaps the sun favoured my holiday because of the piece of heather I carried, given to me for good luck on leaving Canada by a Scotch lassie!

The first day we sailed down the Clyde on a British Railways coastal steamer. It was a very beautiful trip, sailing down the river and among some of the many locks. The ship called with mail, passengers and freight at places having such Scottish names as Dunoon, Rothesay and Tighnabruich. We went ashore for a short stroll about the pretty little fishing village of Yarbort, when the folk basked in the sun, and the fishermen mended their nets.

For the next three days we rented a car and headed north through the Trossachs, then via Braemar and Balmoral Castle to Aberdeen, returning by the east coast to Edinburgh, and so back to Glasgow. Rental cars for tourists seem to be excellent. Ours was a new Vauxhall Victoria and most comfortable. The thought of driving "the wrong way" on the left hand side of the road, with the right-hand steering wheel - had worried me a bit but it came surprisingly easy. The only near difficulty happened in Aberdeen during the late afternoon rush hour traffic. I was making a left-hand turn at a busy intersection downtown, and proceeded to drive to the middle of the intersection and around the "bobby" on traffic duty. Of course it brought us facing the line of on-coming traffic - nothing more happened than a puzzled look from the busy bobby! The countryside is dotted with picturesque castles and country homes set in wooded lots. Many of these have now been turned into hotels, youth hostels or apartment houses, because the owners could not keep them up with such high taxation. Balmoral Castle is set in picturesque wooded and farm land. It, as you know, is the Scottish castle of the Queen. We drove through the grounds of Glamis (continued on page 7)
