Local Canning Factory Will Re-open, Leased for Year

After being closed down and used for warehouse storage purposes only, since 1948, the Claremont Cannery will operate again this year, owner "Mike" Williamson told The Tribune Monday. The well-known tomato factory opposite the C.P.R. station has been leased for one season to Mr. Thos. McKenzie of Oshawa, and workmen are already busy preparing the plant for operation. Mr. McKenzie has contracted with the growers for one hundred acres of tomatoes and hopes to produce an output of 30,000 cases. The plant employs between fifteen and twenty hands when in full production.

Roy Scott CCF Candidate in Local By-election

A veteran of the first world war, Herbert Roy Scott is a farmer, keen sportsman and a former member of Reach Township Council. He has operated his farm in Seagrave for over 30 years.

Born April 8, 1898 in Port Hope, Mr. Scott was 18 months old when his family moved to New Liskeard in Northern Ontario, where he spent his boyhood and school days. At the time New Liskeard was 85 miles from the nearest railway.

In June, 1915, at the age of 17, Mr. Scott enlisted in Hailebury with the 58th Infantry Battalion as a scout and served for the duration of the first world war. Following his discharge, he accompanied his parents to Seagrave where he bought the farm where he now lives.

In 1920, he married Gladys Harrison of Myrtle Station. The Scotts have three sons, Kenneth of Oakwood, Harold of Barrie and Beverly of Oshawa.

Keenly interested in youth activities and promotion of good sport, Mr. Scott is serving his second term as president of the Tri-County Baseball League, consisting of 14 teams located from Stouffville to Bobcaygeon.

Mr. Scott has municipal political experience having served four years as a member of Reach Township Council. He is a member of the Canadian Legion and the Port Perry Businessmen's Association.

Salary Increases Granted to Uxbridge Township Teachers

At a regular meeting of Uxbridge Public School Area Board on Thursday night it was decided to grant a \$200 increase to six of the nine teachers commencing with the fall term. Two teachers, one at Roseville and another at Quaker Hill will replace the two resignations handed in last month. One other is increasing his qualifications at the present time.

A delegation from the Glasgow district met with the Board and discussed the salary question to some length.

"Why is an increase in wages necessary for the teachers in the area?" questioned the spokesman for the group.

"When other school boards go over your head it is necessary for us to bring about an increase in salaries in order to obtain the teacher we desire," explained Public School Area Board Chairman Wm. Hewlett.

"Uxbridge town raised their teachers' wages \$400 at the beginning of the fall term and tacked on another \$200 increase at Christmas," commented Board member Pickett, "that is the situation that this Board must contend with."

"A one hundred dollar increase is nothing if a good teacher is obtained or held," argued Board Member Walter Beach.

One of the school board members believed that all the teachers should be put on a salary schedule but this idea was strongly opposed by the Chairman of the Board Wm. Hewlett.

"If teachers are to work on a salary schedule then they should be willing to teach in whatever school we wish to place them and this board knows that the teachers will not agree to this idea," claim-

ed Mr. Hewlett.

At the time of the meeting all the schools in the area were assured of a teacher for the coming term with the exception of Glasgow and one of the members believed that an agreement would be reached before the next sitting of the board.

Mr. Geo. Todd of Goodwood was given the 27 ton coal contract for the Area at a price of \$25.00 a ton delivered.

She held that post for four and one-half years until her present appointment at Montreal, where she has been conducting research on child and adult hearing.
