The 71 head offered brought \$24,515 for a general average of \$345 which compares with the average of a year ago of \$445. Forty-two bred heifers averaged \$404; 27 open yearlings \$263 and two bulls \$202 each.

The highest price of the day was \$525 paid by Keith Sanderson, Shanty Bay, Ont. for O.H.O. Abbecker Model Comet, a bred heifer sired by Glenafton Comet, XXX and Reserve All-Canadian son of the noted Marksman. Second highest price of \$500 was paid by Findlay Dairy Farm, Toronto, and

the third top of \$480 came from Jesse R. Robinson, Brampton, Ont. Both of the latter were bred heifers.

J. D. Gale, Guelph, was the big buyer of the day, taking nine head for a total of \$2330.00. Included amongst his purchases was the top priced open yearling at \$380. H. A. Burnett, Orillia, bought seven head for a total of \$2215.00 while John Knox, Hampton, paid \$1,000 for four head.

Other good prices paid included \$450 by George & Harvey Evans, Queensville, \$460 by R. J. Steele, Creemore; \$450 by Keith Sanderson; \$400, M. H. Farms, Milliken.

And the little ones? They love colour. If it is bright they love it—if it isn't they don't. But all are seeing the paintings of their own countrymen in this very age in which they live.

The first Saturday in July is Cedar Grove Garden Party.

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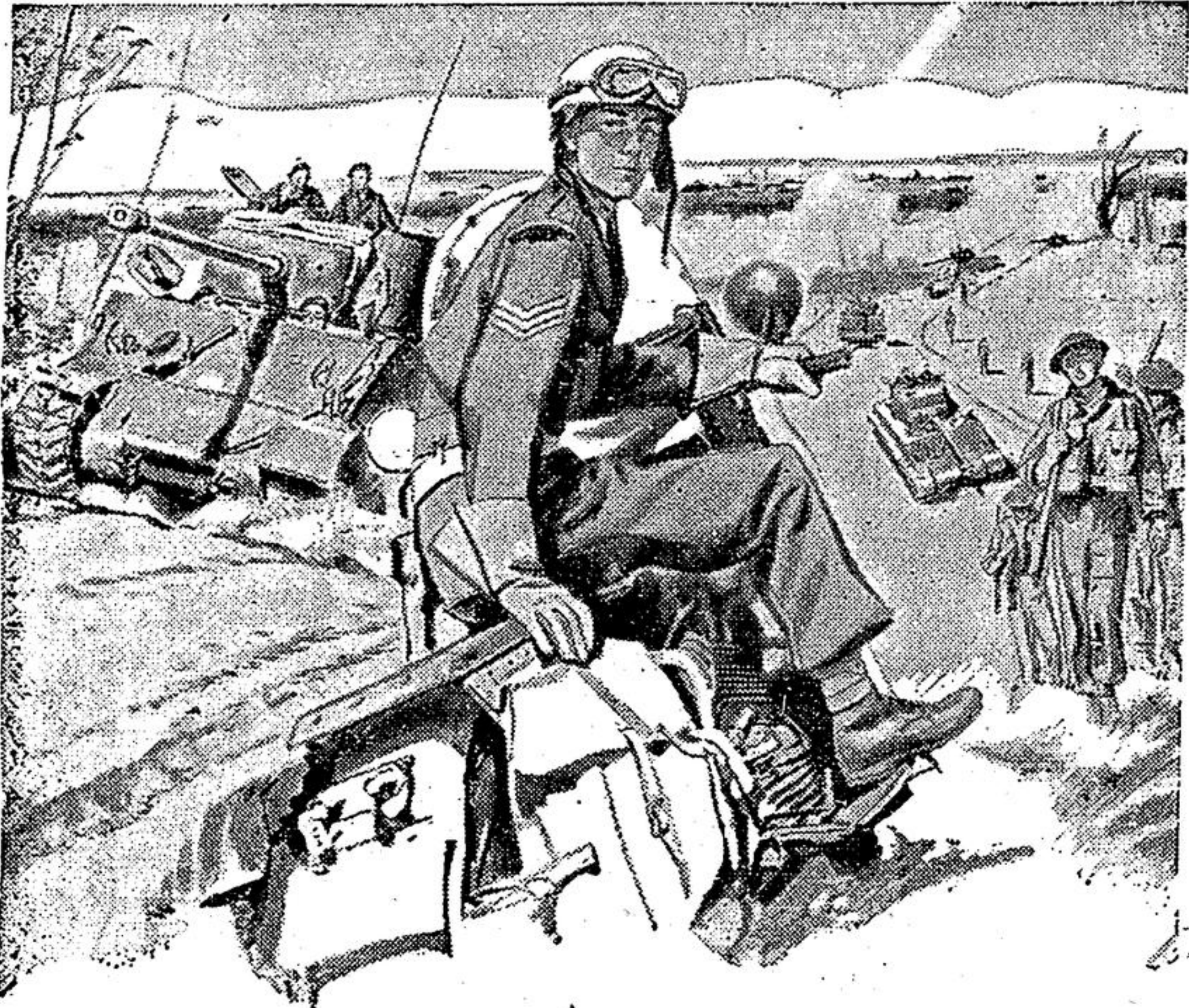
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
