## Tree Agreement with County and Province Is Renewed

An agreement between the County of York and the Ontario government concerning the work of reforestation has been renewed for thirty years. The agreement which was to expire in 1954, provides that the province will plant the trees and the county will purchase the land and maintain. Arrangements to extend the agreement were completed last week.

### Tour Forest

County Council members and officials made their annual inspection of the county forest at Vivian last week. The party, about 75 in number visited the County Home for the Aged in the morning arriving at Cedar Beach Gardens, Musselman's Lake for luncheon at noon. Fred Timbers, deputy-reeve of Whitchurch Township and chairman of the re-forestation committee in county council conducted the brief address period at dinner. Lex Mackenzie, provincial government member, along with Jos. Spilette, warden of York County and the wardens of Peel and Simcoe Counties were all

present and addressed the gathering. The county forest has now reached the proportions of 3,300 acres, and only a part was toured in the afternoon as time permitted.

Lex Mackenzie, M.P.P., proved his keenness for woodcraft as he won the contest conducted during the trip to identify twenty different kinds of trees. A contest to guess the number of cords of wood in some of the large piles of cut logs also added to the interest in the trip.

## Whitchurch Council Sets Policy for Charity Donations

In one of the shortest meetings held by Whitchurch Township in many months, a resolution was carried setting for a policy to be followed in dealing with all requests for assistance from charitable organizations. The resolution declared that council should in future deal with all such requests on their merits. A resolution which followed to send a donation of \$5 to the Scott Mission in Toronto, was defeated.

Council recently made donations to the Institute for the Blind and the Salvation Army following a prolonged discussion on the subject of such donations.

"I still think we made a mistake in starting to give donations and we possibly hurt them as local organizations won't work as hard now to raise funds to help," declared Councillor Baycroft.

Deputy-reeve Timbers maintained that it was a matter of policy and that council should definitely declare a definite policy for all future cases.

Councillor McCarron was of the opinion that the two organizations previously contributed to were national, while the Scott Mission which admittedly did a fine work, was strictly a local Toronto charitable institution. "I'd prefer to deal with each request individually," he said.

A communication was read from M. Gilchrist, sec'y of the Vivian School stating that this section did not wish to enter any school area. While attendance at the Vivian School was a mere handful a few years back, more than forty were now attending. Council declared that there was no intention of including Vivian in any area.

A petition from residents of the CFB side road for an improved road was left in the hands of the road committee and superintendent.

Relief accounts for the month totalled only \$163, or only about half of the previous month.

Road Supt. Davis reported that the oiling of the 9th con. from the lake to Stouffville was to commence this week.

## Ward System Being Discussed For Markham Twp.

A resolution to investigate the establishing of a ward system in the township of Markham was carried on a divided vote of council on Monday evening. Councillors LeMasurier and Lennie opposed the move.

Reeve Timbers stated that the suggestion was advanced a year ago and tossed aside at that time. Councillor LeMasurier wanted to know what the advantages were, and if the three wards suggested would be established as to population or geographically.

A bylaw calling for Markham Township to issue debentures of a new Markham Area High School at a cost of \$525,000, was given two readings and forwarded to the Municipal Board for approval.

The matter of the new township office was discussed briefly, and it was stated that work on the new township garage at Buttonville was to commence this week. Councillor LeMasurier stated that he had heard the erection of the township office was to be dropped. Deputy-reeve James and Councillor Hooper immediately denied this report, and stated that the building committee was merely marking time for the present until a new course of action could be determined. Only one tender was received when tenders were called recently and it was for a price of \$78,000 which council believed to be away out of line with the building they wished to erect.

Councillor Hooper said that he favored obtaining invitation bids and proceed.
