Council Discusses Hard Surfacing Wilcox Lake Road
 A figure of \$8,000 was given as a possible price for the hard surfacing of the Lake Wilcox south road when Whitechurch Council discussed the matter on Thursday evening. Councillor E. L. McCarron brought the matter before council. He stated that he believed it would be good business to pave this road while it was still in good condition, providing the gravel trucks could be kept from pounding it to pieces.
 The stretch of road in question is from Ash's pavilion to Yonge St., a distance of a little more than one and a quarter miles. A four inch top would be required to do a good job.
 "I'd favour going ahead with it and putting restrictions on trucks using it," stated Councillor McCarron.
 It was agreed by council that road supt. Davis should get several quotations on a much top for this road and place before council at a future date.
Pond for New Park
 Reeve Ivan McLaughlin told council that the new Community Centre Board which was undertaking the job of establishing a township park on land purchased opposite the municipal offices, was in need of funds. He further stated that the board hoped to be self-sustaining but some money was required to begin the project.
 It was revealed that a pond was to be dug on the property fed by a spring creek. The pond is to be 60'x100' and several bids are being taken on this part of the work.
 Road Supt. Davis told council that the Gold Fish Supply Co., Stouffville, had requested per-

mission to erect a small pump house on the road allowance to house a new electric pump for pumping water in their fish ponds near the 5th con. However council was not favorable to allow any buildings on the road right-of-way and suggested that the company should purchase a small piece of property on which to erect the building.
To Co-ordinate Planning
 A joint meeting of the councils and planning boards of Markham, Vaughan, King and Whitechurch Townships was held at the Whitechurch office on Wednesday evening. The purpose of the meeting was to endeavor to get more unification of land restriction bylaws among the four municipalities. During the meeting some progress was made and certain restrictions, were agreed upon which will be incorporated into a bylaw to be presented to all councils for approval at a future date.
Work This Week at Lake
 "I have been told that we agreed to Beamish Construction doing the work on the Lake Wilcox road at their convenience, and I want it clearly understood by the rate-payers in that area that this is not the case," stated Councillor McCarron. Councillor McCarron went on to say that he had been in touch with the Beamish firm and they expected to commence work there this week. There had been a slight delay due to a foreman being ill.
