17. Bouquet for a sick room.
18. Shadow box arrangement.
19. Diminutive bouquet not more than 8" each way.
20. Miniature arrangement not more than 4" each way.
21. Madonna Lily, 1 stem.
22. Regale or Creelman Lily, 1 stem.
23. Lily, other than white, 1 stem.
24. Corsage.
25. Decorative Vegetable Arrangement.
