Sunderland Beat Out Red Sox for Tournament Prize

Toronto B-A curve artist Rene Bouchard twirled two complete seven inning games for Sunderland on Tuesday afternoon to make a clean sweep of the holiday ball tournament before a good crowd of home town and visiting spectators.

Sunderland blanked Bill Harper and his Port Perry Squad 6-0 in the first game of the semi-final round as Bouchard held the opposition to a few scattered hits. Lefty Harper lacked his usual pitching form and had to seek relief late in the contest. Stouffville took their game from Sutton 4-3.

The Stouffville crew were matched against their old rivals with hurler Holborne on the mound. The local crew were not caught napping however and when word was received that Sunderland was packing their squad the homesters brought up Jack Rawson, a tall right hander from Stanton Fuel.

Both clubs tagged a hit in the first innings but no runs crossed the plate. Bud Lehman, who proved himself to be one of the most consistent batters for the Red Sox rifled a sharp single into short centre but was nipped off at second when he attempted to stretch the hit for extra bases. Learoyd touched ace hurler Rawson for a double in the first and a walk to Holborne put two Sutton runners on base. With two away the fifth batter to the plate slammed what appeared to be a home run ball into deep left field but Cadieux came through with a running one handed catch and although he dropped to the ground the ball remained firmly held in his gloved hand.

Stouffville unleashed a vicious attack in the top half of the third when they came through with their entire four runs. Nicholson, the first man to bat, singled into left field and although Cadieux fluffed to Taylor at short and McMullen went down swinging, Lorne Schell walked and Lehman doubled bringing Nicholson in. An infield error on a pop fly by Hassard kept the local rally going strong with the bases loaded. With two away, hard hitting Ken Schell slugged out a single driving two runs across which proved enough to win the game.

Sutton showed signs of getting back in the game as Bill Harper playing under the Green Sox colors brought Rowe in with a single run in the fourth. Two errors in the Red Sox infield allowed one Sutton run to score in the sixth and with two away the next batter smashed a long liner into deep left field but once again Cadieux came to the rescue with a brilliant one handed catch that brought cheers from the stands.

Sutton counted one more run in the seventh when Harper doubled and a single by Holborne brought him around but the Sutton hurler was tagged at third when he galloped off the sack and couldn't retrieve his steps in time.
