Mr. Chas. Hoover, Markham, Ont. Re: Proposed Construction of Garage

Dear Sir: Your letter of June 23rd together with copy of agreement and specifications, resolution and special agreement has been received.

In reply I have consulted our Head Office concerning this matter and have to advise that the Department is not prepared to approve this contract on a cost plus basis. I note that the resolution does not contain any condition that it shall be subject to Department approval but assume that it would be the intention of your council that it should be. It is unfortunate that an agreement has been entered into on this basis without the consent of the Department. I understand that I have been quoted as having approved such a proposal, but this is not correct. When a deputation from your council called on me on May 14th and suggested a cost plus contract I certainly did not encourage them to expect that it would be approved, though I did agree that they might submit further information and details on the proposal. I heard no more of the matter until informed by an outside party that the contract had been let.

It is my opinion that tenders should be called again. If Mr. Spang is prepared to fulfill the contract at \$35,000.00 and is the low bidder I will be pleased to recommend approval. I fail to see why he should not be prepared to submit a firm tender as readily as enter into the present agreement unless it is that under the agreement he does not appear to have to provide a bond guaranteeing completion.
