Steam-Roller Uxbridge With 16 Run Splurge

Stouffville Red Sox exploded with a sixteen run barrage in the sixth innings in their game with Uxbridge on Monday night to sink the celler-dwellers 26-3. The home town crew connected with seven hits, received seven walks and were aided by a couple of errors in the wild base running exhibition staged in their final turn at the bat. The Red Sox were on their third trip around the batting order before the side was finally retired.

The winners failed to score a run in the first as McMullen and Hassard went down on strikes and Lehman grounded out second to first. Uxbridge did manage to get a hit in the first as Shier singled but pitcher Pearson and Bradbury went down swinging and Gleason was thrown out. L. Schell to Chadwick covering first to leave the runner stranded on third. The Red Sox broke out with five hits in the second netting them three runs to take the lead. L. Schell, Chadwick and Cadieux crossed the plate to start the ball rolling. Uxbridge broke into the scoring in the third with two runs on hits by Shier, Pearson and Pawns but hurler Lorne Boardway on the mound for Stouffville allowed but three hits during the following four innings and held the opposition to one lone run.

The homesters scored three more in the fourth, four in the fifth and sixteen in the sixth. The visitors used three pitchers in the game but could not hold the Red Sox in check. Ted Cadieux came through with the best batting performance for the winners with five hits in six turns at the bat. Shier, the Uxbridge short stop, had a good night with three safeties in four trips to the plate.

Red Sox Edge Sunderland 12-11 Though Shorthanded

Stouffville Red Sox came through on Friday night to hand Sunderland a bitter 12-11 defeat right on their own home diamond with a scrapped up squad of nine players, many of them holding down positions entirely unfamiliar to them. Lorne Schell went to the mound for the local crew with coach Hassard completing the battery. Ted Cadieux, who regularly holds down left field position, found himself perched on first base with Lehman on second and Lorne Boardway on third. Murray McMullen moved back one spot from his regular position to short with Raxlin, Nicholson and Smith covering the outfield. The big question was whether this scattered lineup could hold out against the Sunderland sluggers.

Starter, Tommy Welsh on the mound for Sunderland fired four balls by Raxlin the first Stouffville batter to face him but Lehman, Hassard and L. Schell went down in order to retire the side. In Sunderland's turn at the plate, hurler Schell took care of hard-hitting Woodward but Anderson reached first with a single. Kerr fled to Nicholson but Welsh hit safely driving in Anderson for the first Sunderland tally. The fifth batter went down swinging leaving one runner stranded.

The Red Sox smashed Welsh for five hits and earned two walks for six runs in the second innings. Nicholson struck out but Cadieux and Smith rifled safe drives into the outfield. Boardway went down on strikes but McMullen kept the rally going with a walk. Raxlin earned his second free ticket of the game and Lehman came through with a timely hit to clear the sacks. Hassard tore the cover off the ball and L. Schell brought him around with a safety. Nicholson died at the plate leaving Schell stranded on second.

Sunderland, never to be counted out until the game is over, rallied to tie the count in the third with five runs. Woodward walked, Anderson hit safely and although Kerr fled to Nicholson the next three batters hammered the ball into the daisies scoring four runs. With one man on base and one out the left fielder singled scoring another run. The next two batters were well taken care off and the side was retired.

The sea-saw battle continued as the locals scored four runs in the fourth only to have Sunderland duplicate the feat to put both clubs once again on even terms. Raxlin worked Welsh for his third walk of the game and Lehman, Hassard and Schell brought the wood into play to score. Although Cadieux reached first Nicholson went down second to first, Smith struck out and Boardway went down swinging to retire the side.

In order to save the situation, Sunderland pulled Welsh from the mound and threw Parrel into the fray. The relief hurler couldn't find the target with Raxlin and for the fourth time in the game he walked to first. Although Lehman fled to left field, Hassard came through with a single to bring Raxlin in. Hassard was later picked off on a fielders choice on L.
