

The with headquarters in Buck- front car contains the pressure pump and spraying mechanism while the three trailing tank cars transport the water and chemical mixture. Each tank car carries 6,000 gallons of water and 1400 gallons of chemical which will spray a distance of 16 miles of track. The pump in the lead car

draws the chemical mixture from the tanks and forces it through the hose at twenty pounds pressure covering a track width of fourteen feet. While passing through Stouff-

ville the machine stopped to take on 6,000 gallons of water. A locomotive provides the pull-

ing power.
