Unionville Resident Milton Thompson Dies Suddenly

Suddenly on Saturday evening, July 12th, Mr. Milton Thompson, a resident of Unionville, passed away in his 54th year. Born in Tyrone, near Bowmanville, at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Thompson, the deceased moved to Toronto and then to Unionville where he has resided for the last fifteen years. His wife, the former Lillian Beatty, still survives.

The late Mr. Thompson was employed as a development engineer at General Steel Wares in Toronto but was a skilled carpenter, a trade that he practiced only as a hobby. It was while engaged in the construction of a home in Markham that he suddenly succumbed. Mr. Thompson had just recently supervised the renovating and designing of the Central United Church in Unionville and lived but long enough to see the work completed.

Besides his wife the deceased leaves to mourn his passing one daughter Mavis (Mrs. Brian McCullum) of Long Branch and one son Edward of Unionville. There are three surviving brothers, Ambrose of Regina, Leslie of Tyrone, Arthur of Oshawa and one sister Almada of Whitby.

Funeral service was held in Unionville United Church on Tuesday afternoon at 3 p.m. conducted by Rev. W. Butt assisted by Rev. Milton Sanderson of North Parkdale United Church, Toronto, with interment in St. Andrew's Cemetery, Markham. The pallbearers were Mr. Harold Guscott, Mr. Gordon Ogden, Mr. W. Mason, Mr. Francis Thompson, Mr. Ray Anderson and Mr. Allan Thompson.

Uxbridge Council Concerned by Gravel Company Operations

Uxbridge Township Council expressed grave concern over what they term encroachment on township property by several gravel concerns. It was stated at the regular meeting on Monday evening that a portion of the township road had been undermined by pit operations. The company involved is the Western Sand and Gravel located in Whitchurch Township.

Councillor John Ball stated that he believed Whitchurch Council should be notified immediately.

Criticism of Stouffville Sand & Gravel was expressed by council over the removal of fill which they claimed was partially blocking the roadway.

At the conclusion of the discussion it was agreed that contacts should be made with both gravel companies and the one located in Whitchurch Township will be asked to erect a guard rail it was stated.

Goodwood Sidewalks Prove Headache for Twp. Council

Members Seek Co-operation of Residents

One of the biggest problems confronting the Uxbridge Township Council at the present time is the construction of a sidewalk in Goodwood. Although the residents were promised some time ago that the job would be done and an appropriation was made on the budget for the expenditure, there are other underlying factors which make the completion of the scheme not only very difficult but almost useless.

The council members know the flood conditions which prevail in Goodwood during the spring but these conditions cannot be righted unless the residents are willing to co-operate. In order that a satisfactory sidewalk may be built it will be necessary to build culverts under the walks to let the water escape and prevent flooding.

Road Supt. Stan Slack explained there was little use in building the sidewalk unless suitable drainage was constructed but he claimed that the residents would only plug the drains up like they have in the past.

"I think we should clean up the ditches and open the culverts," said Councillor Bunker.

"You'll need an army to do it," argued Road Supt. Slack.

"Let us go ahead with the walk and if the residents plug the drains we will make them clean out the culverts just as they must clean up junk that is dumped on the roadside," continued Councillor Bunker.

"This subject has been kicked around long enough," claimed Reeve Catherwood, "I think we should start the walk complete with culverts."

"If we don't start soon it will be too late," agreed Councillor Dowsell.

Road Supt. Slack explained that the water follows its natural course in Goodwood but the residents are not satisfied to let it follow that course but insist on backing it up until a miniature lake is formed.

"If the ditches and culverts had been left open the sidewalks that are there to-day would be alright," continued Mr. Slack.

The council after much discussion agreed to investigate the possibility of purchasing 200 bags of cement for the purpose of constructing a walk south of the four corners on the west side of the road.

Rent controls are expected to continue in most of the larger cities.

Markham Purchases Second New Truck

Markham Township Council on Monday evening agreed by resolution to purchase a new 4-ton International truck from International Motors in Stouffville at a tender price of \$5,000. Council recently purchased a pickup truck from Little's of Richmond Hill for use by the road supt.

Road Supt. Buchanan explained that the township had had two trucks hired this year and had hired one nearly all last winter. Councillor LeMasurier attempted to argue that new drivers would have to be engaged. The road supt. told council no new men would be necessary as the one rented truck was already being driven by a township employee.

Councillor Hooper pressed for the purchase of a new 4-wheel drive truck. He stated that if \$5,000 could be saved in the building of the new municipal garage the heavier truck could be purchased.

Councillor LeMasurier said that he understood the road supt. to say that trucks could be rented cheaper than owned, but Mr. Buchanan denied this.

Reeve Timbers was not favorable to the large truck as he contended the department would not approve of the additional expenditure. During a brief lull in proceedings the resolution was passed to purchase the 4-ton truck. Councillors LeMasurier and Hooper were not present at the time.
