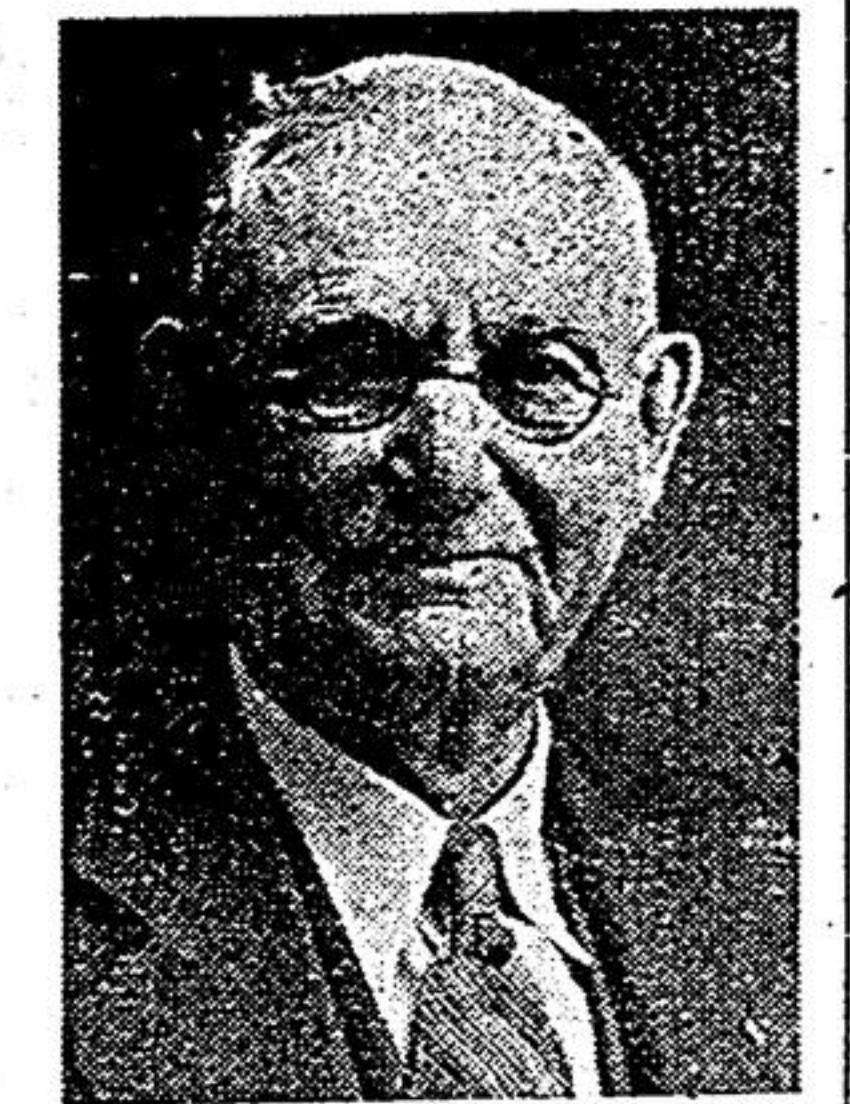


### Geo. Tran Celebrates 97th Birthday

Mallory of Bridgeport who has the unusual hobby of raising these birds. It seems that some months ago Rev. A. M. Mallory received three peafowl from a relative in Vancouver Island. Although somewhat of a unique gift, the pastor decided to keep them and accordingly placed them in his back yard. The female of the group proved herself to be a "wild, wild woman."
