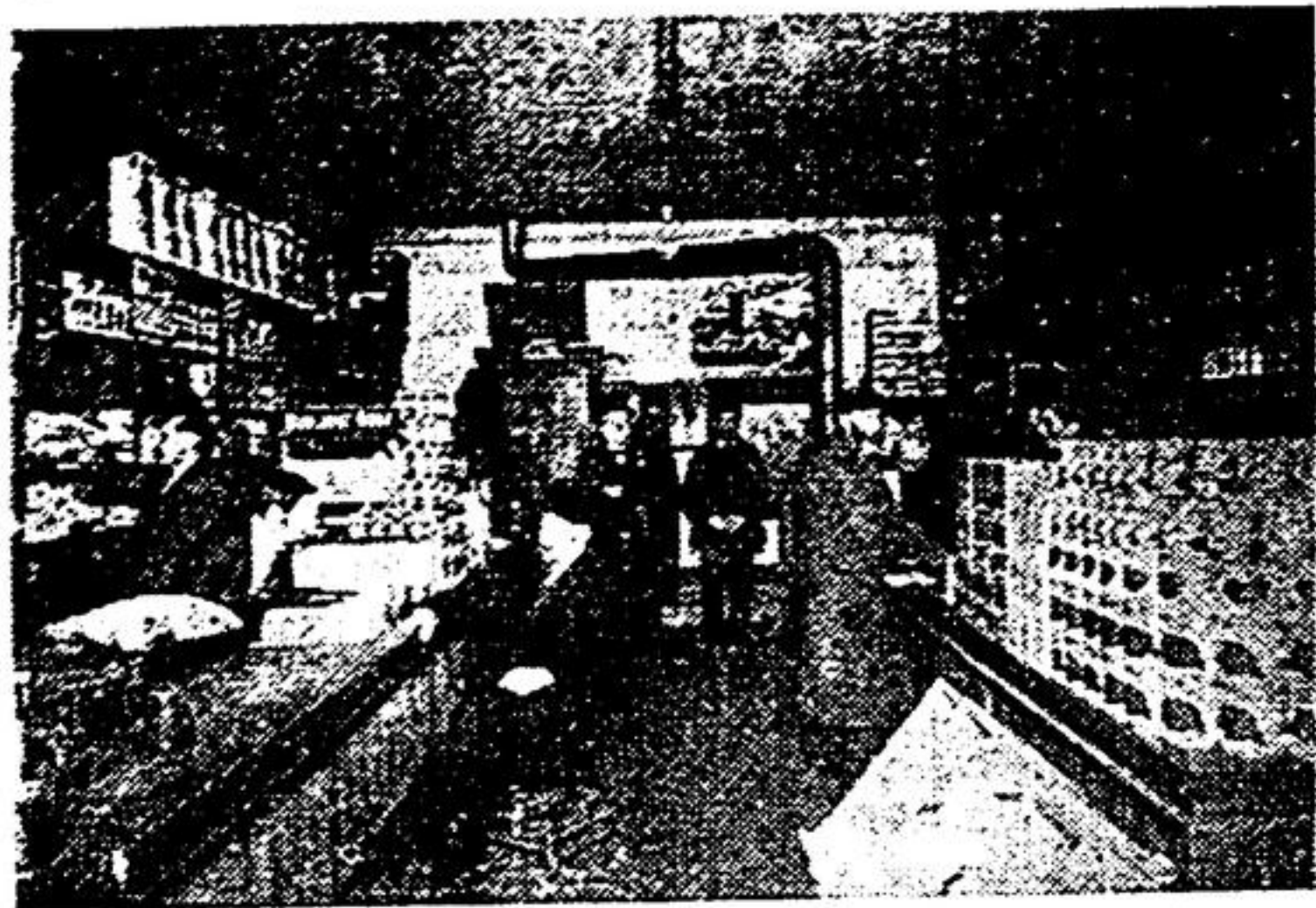

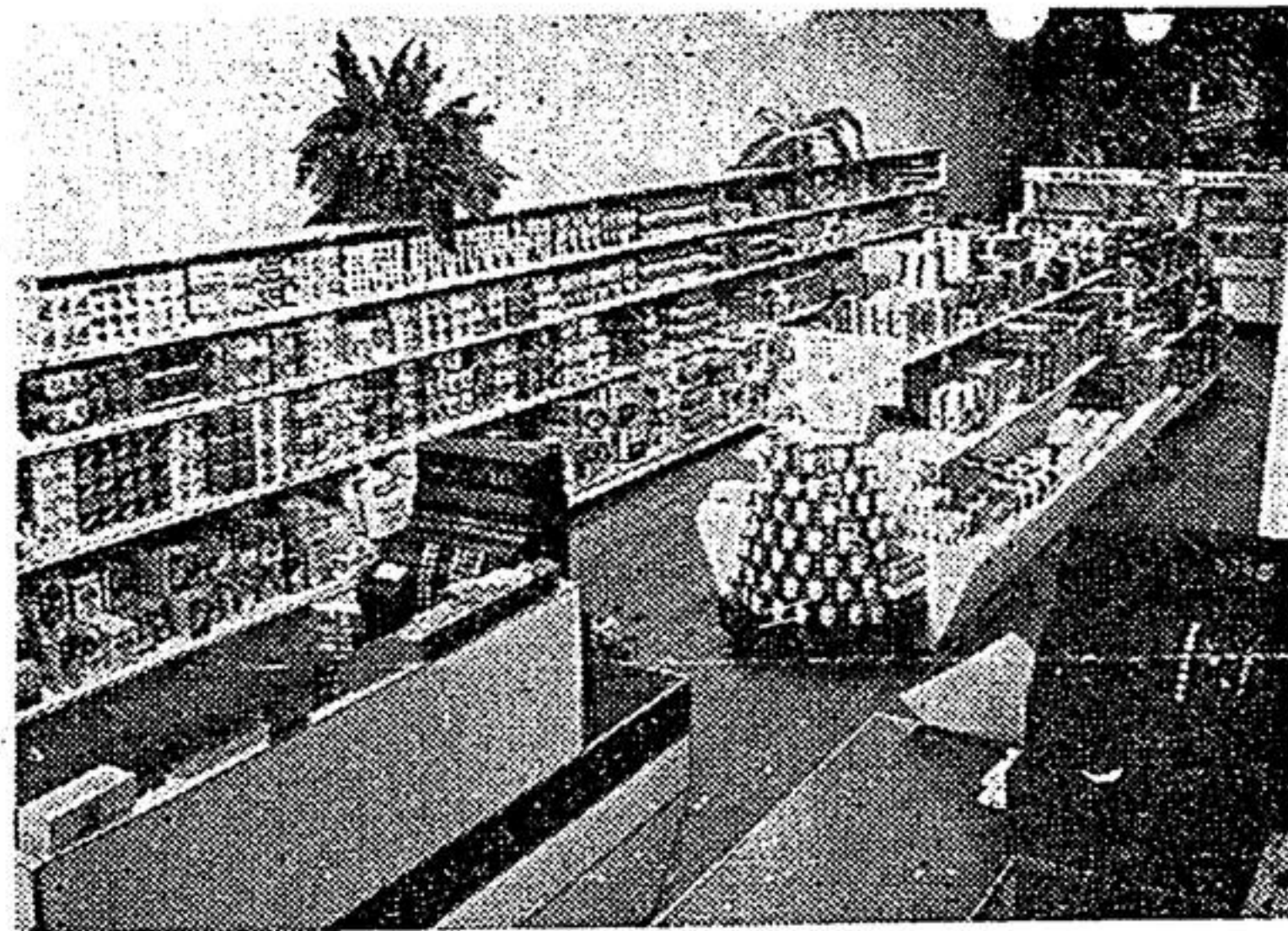

### Watch Granaries For Weevil

With wheat threshing and combining, farmers are reminded to check on their granaries for grain weevil before putting in their new crops. Agricultural Representative W. M. Cockburn of Newmarket points out that each year shortly after the wheat is threshed, several farmers find their bins heating as a result of thousands of these small brown beetles, about 1/4 of an inch in length.

The important time in control is just before harvest when grain stocks are at a low level. If a small amount of infested grain is left over, move it to another storage if possible. Clean granary thoroughly and apply hydrated lime liberally to all cracks and corners. The bins themselves should be sprayed with DDT or kerosene. Do not apply DDT to the grain itself. If kerosene is used, soak the boards, taking precaution concerning fire. A compressed air, knapsack or wheelbarrow sprayer is very suitable for this work. With DDT the 5% oil spray, emulsion or 50% wettable spray powder may be used. (1 lb. of the 50% wettable spray powder in 1 gallon of water gives approximately a 5% spray. If the 25% emulsion is used, dilute 1 quart with 4 quarts of kerosene.) Infested grain should not be held over unless it is fumigated or removed from the granary where the current crop is to be stored. If two grain storages are in use on a farm, plan to have one empty each year and carry out a complete clean-up on this one as outlined above. Instructions for treating infested grain or granaries can be obtained from the office of your Agricultural Representative.

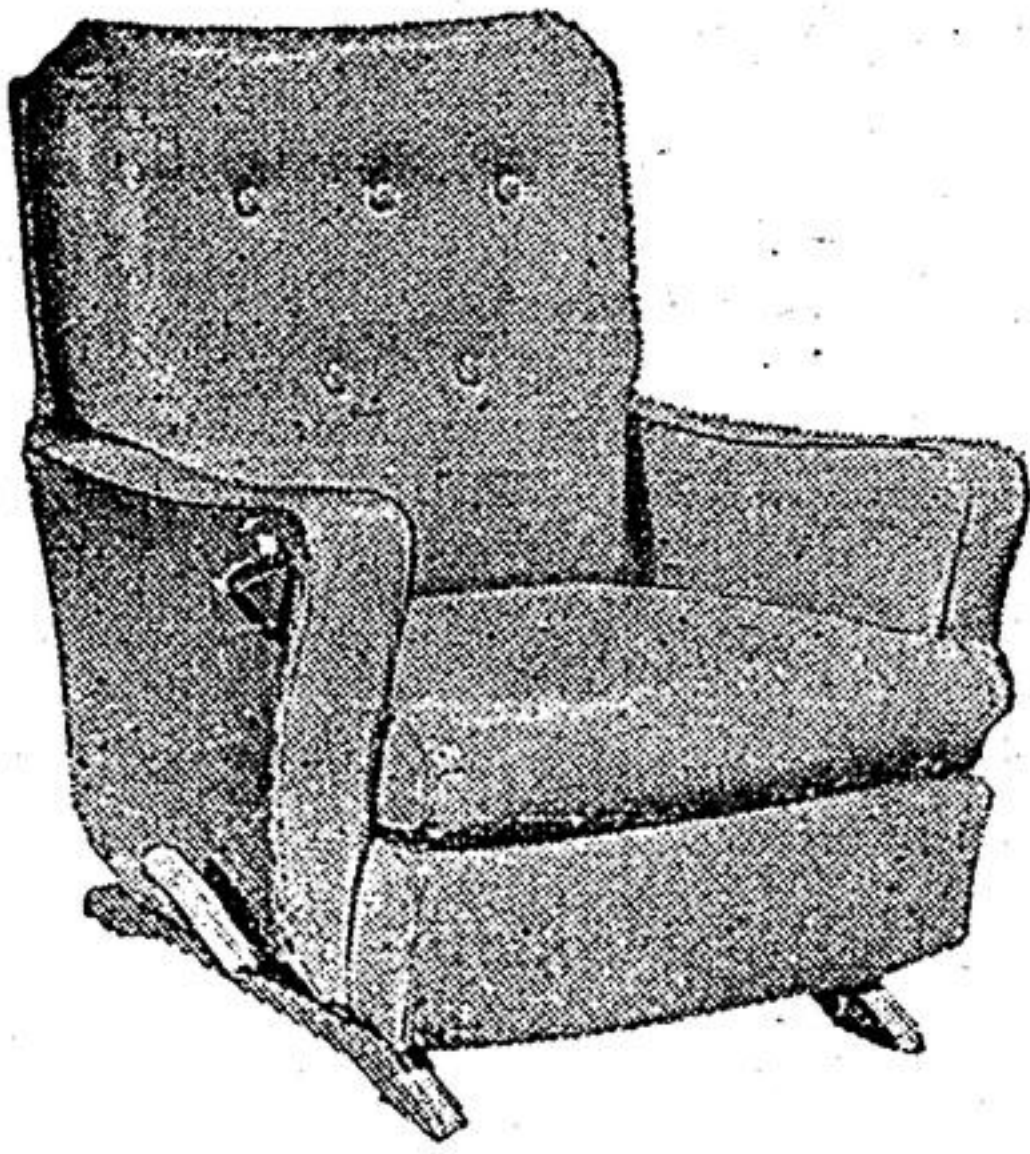

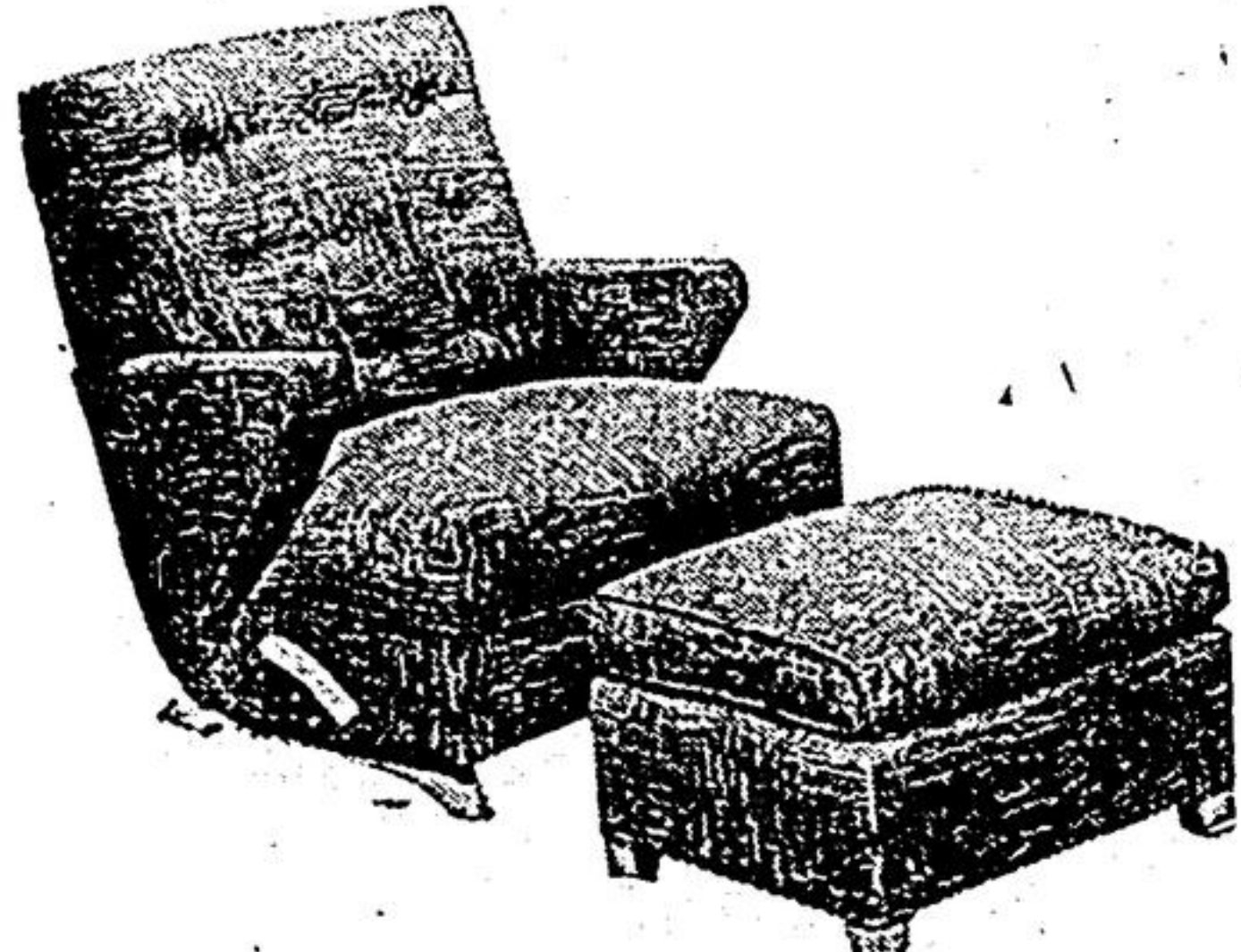
