

MIDNIGHT BLOOM



Owned by Mr. and Mrs. Douglas Ferguson, 7th con. of Markham, this climbing Cereus was snapped by The Tribune carmeraman as it opened its blooms at midnight the only time the plant flowers once each year. The peculiar specimen has angled branches and large fragrant white flowers. It is a member of the

Cactus family. This particular plant is about four years old and bloomed last year onenight for the first. It was grown from a slip and has three blooms each night which is believed unusual. The plants grow largely in Bermuda. The flower seen here is about nine inches across. The plant stands over six feet.
