It was a wonderful piece of work and made in about a year, reminding one of Queen Mary's work of art. Some of these rugs were for sale from \$7.20 for a small braided one to \$240.00 for a large braided one. Houses, barns, animals, fowls of all kinds and flowers were hooked and displayed in these wonderful pieces requiring months of patient toil. You are invited to enter an original quilt or rug next year. The museum was visited also, displaying Indian relics, costumes, cutlery, native birds, eggs, insects, animals, inspiring the District President to awaken interest among members of South Ontario, towards the establishment of a museum in our district for the preservation of history.
