Pickering Council Takes Note of Valiant Action

Recommendation that Gordon Stevens, 14, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred A. Stevens, Whitby Township, be given an award for saving a life, is being made to the Red Cross by Pickering Township Council. The Stevens boy, who lives on Highway No. 7, two miles west of Brooklin, pulled Clifford Reynolds, 10, from the water of a swimming pool at a school picnic on June 27 when the younger lad was overcome and unconscious. Using the prone pressure method, Kinsale school teacher Gordon Graham and others, brought the Reynolds boy to consciousness after working on him four or five minutes.

Clifford, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Reynolds who live northwest of Brougham, was given medical attention for shock. Next day he was a little the worse for his experience.

The two lads do not attend the same schools but both were at a picnic at Lynbrook Park on the closing day of school. According to witnesses, Clifford slipped off the sloping side of the pool into water beyond his depth and due to the murkiness of the pool, it was not until some moments later that his companions noticed he was not playing and had not come to the surface. At this point Gordon Stevens grabbed Clifford and pulled him to the side of the pool.

After hearing of the incident recently, Pickering Township Councilors expressed the belief that their recommendation to the Red Cross would be in order and that the good work of Gordon Stevens should be recognized.

Pickering Chief Requests Pulmotor For Life-Saving

Lives might have been saved in the past and may be saved in the future if fire brigades are equipped with a pulmotor, Chief of Police L. W. Trinnell of Pickering told the Township Council in his monthly report.

He writes: "Once again the need of a pulmotor for the area has been shown by the untimely death by drowning of a 20-year-old youth, in the Rouge River. The body was recovered approximately seven minutes after the lad had collapsed and had our fire department been equipped with a pulmotor, this life might have been saved. I strongly recommend the purchase of this, together with dragging hooks and a small duck boat to assist in the saving of life."

In the same connection, council instructed its clerk to write to John Graham, asking him to post signs in his park, advising of any dangerous holes in the Rouge River and advise that if there are any further drownings, guards will be necessary; also post signs in the areas that are safe for bathing."

In the same report but speaking on another topic, Chief Trinnell says: "Juveniles have been active again, stealing from the clothing and cars of bathers. Charges have been laid and some of the money or property recovered."

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Sask. Premier Entertained Here

Several dozen friends and press representatives gathered on the lawn of the spacious VonPiils home near Pickering on Saturday evening and heard the Hon. T. C. Douglas, premier of Saskatchewan give a brief but interesting and informative talk on the workings of his C.C.F. government in the West. The Sask. Premier was introduced by E. B. Joliffe, Ontario C.C.F. leader while M. J. Coldwell, federal leader, was also present.

The western prime minister stated that while Saskatchewan had been practically bankrupt when his government came into power eight years ago, the province now had the second lowest per capita farm debt in the Dominion, and the lowest per capita municipal debt.

He dwelt at some length on the

hospitalization and insurance services as handled by the government. The hospital rate is currently \$10 per person per year or \$30 for a family.

Communism and war were pointed out as the two great threats facing the world today. Communism, the speaker said, could only be stopped by producing a better idea.
