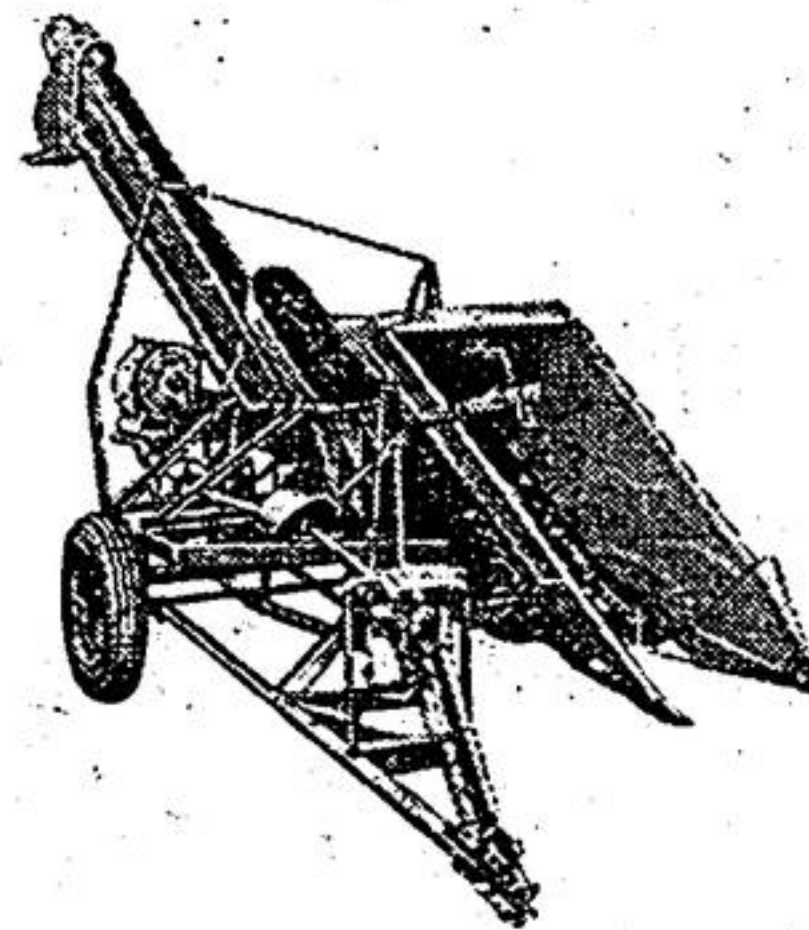

COPY OF PAINTING IS PUBLISHED

"History of the Ontario Regiment" a new volume just released and written by Captain Lex Schragg presently with the Globe & Mail contains a full page painting in color by Arnold B. Hodgkins of Stouffville.

The painting, the only one in the finely bound volume that is in color, is captioned, "Casa Barardi-Orton" and the original hangs in the Oshawa Armouries.

The Ontario Regiment originated in 1866 and Arnold Hodgkins who has been the instructor at the local Art Classes during the winter months here, is a former member of the Regiment.

The deceased was a long time resident of the police village and was in his 87th year.
