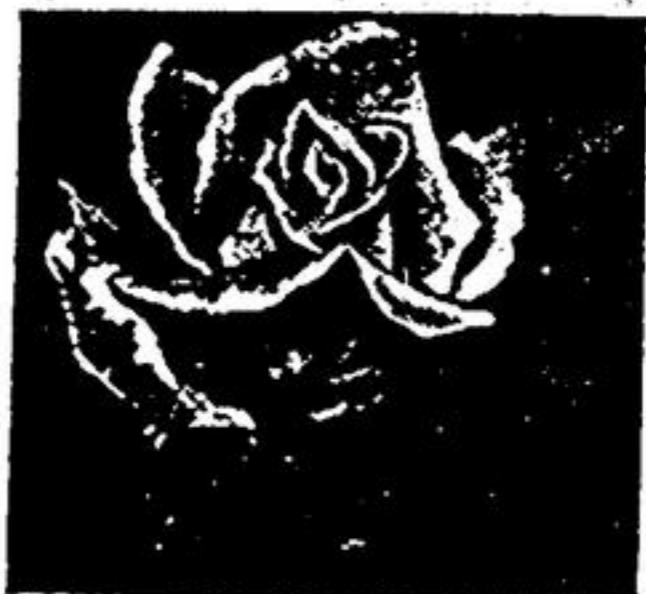

Claremont Canning Factory Reaches Peak Production

The Claremont canning factory, which has been in operation for the past two weeks will hit peak production this week as the tomatoes roll in from the some twenty growers around the community. The factory operated by Tom McKenzie of Oshawa employs some forty-five workers with all but two of these living in Claremont. The foreman, Mr. H. Immel of Grafton, Ont., claims the variety which is coming in at the present time

ranges from good to fair. Every load passes strict government inspection with the tomatoes being classed as first, grade, second grade and culls. The factory is in operation from 7 a.m. until 6 p.m. The factory has contracted for over one hundred acres of tomatoes. Mr. McKenzie, the present operator, is the owner of a larger plant at Colborne and has been connected with the canning business for the past four years.

New Sidewalk Completed in Village

Some six hundred feet of sidewalk has been laid on the east side of Claremont by Messrs. Norm and Harv. Bunker. The job measures a considerable distance south along the main street to the four corners turning east for some thirty feet. The work is expertly done by the two construction men and adds considerably to the appearance of the village.

Public School Attendance Up

The total attendance at the Claremont Public School at the end of the first week has reached 104 in comparison with 98 on the roll for the corresponding period last year. Grade 1 has the largest number of pupils with eighteen beginners with grade seven following close behind with sixteen. Grades four, five and eight have an enrollment of fifteen each. There are ten pupils in grade three, eight in grade two and seven in grade six. There is but one change in the teaching staff, Miss Ivy Schneider of Claremont replacing Miss Cox who has taken a teaching position in North York. Miss Schneider will supervise grades one and two.
