Move To Ban Strong Drink at Wedding Receptions

The Christian Church today is faced with such adversaries as pride, paganism and profligacy, all products of North America's power and its materialistic philosophy. . . . is the statement contained in a report to be presented to the General Council of The United Church of Canada when that high court meets in Hamilton, Sept. 10, to 20.

The forthright statement is signed by Rev. Arthur Organ of Hamilton and Rev. James R. Mutchmor, Toronto, chairman and secretary respectively of the Board of Evangelism and Social Service. The Board calls upon ministers of the United Church "to call all men to repent of their sins . . . to accept Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord . . . to witness to the Gospel of His redeeming love . . . to support the church's fellowship . . . to promote the whole Gospel of God."

The Board will ask General Council to endorse its plea to have alcoholic beverages not served at wedding receptions . . . to encourage the use of churches for wedding ceremonies . . . and to encourage women's groups in the church to cater at weddings in the church.

Did You Know These TB Survey Facts

Approximately 100 chests can be x-rayed in one hour by the machine Gage Institute is sending to Stouffville United Church from 1 to 9 p.m. on Tuesday, Sept. 30th, and Wed. Oct. 1st.

If your previous x-ray was negative, you still need to come—tuberculosis could have developed since. All age groups should come from 12 up. Children 6-12 will be x-rayed if accompanied by parent or guardian if they have been in contact with TB. Men remove their suit coats and vests, ladies should wear plain clothing free from metallic buttons and jewellery. You do not disrobe.

As evening hours will be busy because many business people must come then, have your x-ray during the afternoon or supper hour if at all possible. Villagers are requested to keep Tuesday-free for out-of-town folk as far as possible, and attend Wednesday instead, but come at any time you can, either day.
