
SITE OF MARKHAM TOWNSHIP COUNCIL "BATTLES"

Yake of Maple announce the The Heidelberg is an all purpose press printing anything from a business card to heavy card and delivering two completed · pieces of each impression if the size of the job requires.

These presses are manufactured in the United States zone of Germany and sold in Canada through the Graphic Equipment Co., Toronto. The press arrived fully boxed from overseas and weighing over a ton and a half posed quite a problem for delivery once it arrived in Stouffville. The use of the Stouffville Machine & Tool Works heavy machinery hoist and Stouffville Motors heavy tow truck were brought into play to place the press at the door of The Tribune office where it was moved on rollers to its assigned position. The new Heidelberg replaces a

hand-operated press in service here over twenty years.
