Plenty of Fowl

With fowl suppers, Thanksgiving and Christmas coming up in that order, it affords much satisfaction to learn that the country has no scarcity of poultry for these festive occasions.

Estimated number of turkeys on farms was 3,300,000 at June 1, according to government survey. This represented an increase of 25 per cent over last year. Domestic fowls were up four per cent, geese 10 per cent and ducks 14 per cent.

Text Books

There has always been a good deal of criticism over the fact that text books are changed so often that they cannot be handed down in the family. Local trustees have no jurisdiction in this matter which is handled entirely by the Department of Education. Perhaps the Minister of Education, Hon. W. Miller, who has been converted from a Conservative to a Liberal, will now give the parents a break by calling a halt to this annual changing of text books.

There was a time when a six-year-old could start out to school with a pencil, scribbler and a few crayons. Now it costs \$7 to start them out and we doubt if they will be any further advanced at the end of the year.

Winter Forecasting

Due to the hot weather this summer has provided, there are amateur weather prophets who insist that we are due for a cold winter and a long one. No doubt they take as their theory that things will even themselves out, given the proper time.

· What do the records show? Intrigued by this type of forecasting the New York Weather Bureau looked into the effects of summer upon winter. The bureau found it was right in 44 years and wrong in 33.

The winter, as an indicator of summer weather, was right in 39 years and wrong in the same number. The decision was made that no forecast for the various seasons. can be based upon previous ones.

To be on the safe side, therefore, the homemaker will do well to plan on a regular eastern Ontario winter.

- Time To Condition The Heating Equipment

The lower temperature of the past few days may produce the first difficulty with heating equipment of the pre-fall season. People need to be reminded of the importance of checking heating equipment before pressing it into service again.

It is a good idea to thoroughly clean all heating equipment, whether oil or coal burning, checking all attachments and making sure all parts are in operating condition. It is well too, in the case of all heating units to proceed with care when starting up. It may be chilly and quick heat may be desired but it is better that one suffer the cold while "getting up steam" than to get quick heat with

possible disastrous results. Many flash fires occur with the first dip of the mercury because people try to force their heating equipment beyond its capacity and without checking its condition. Hast is certainly apt to make waste in starting heating






