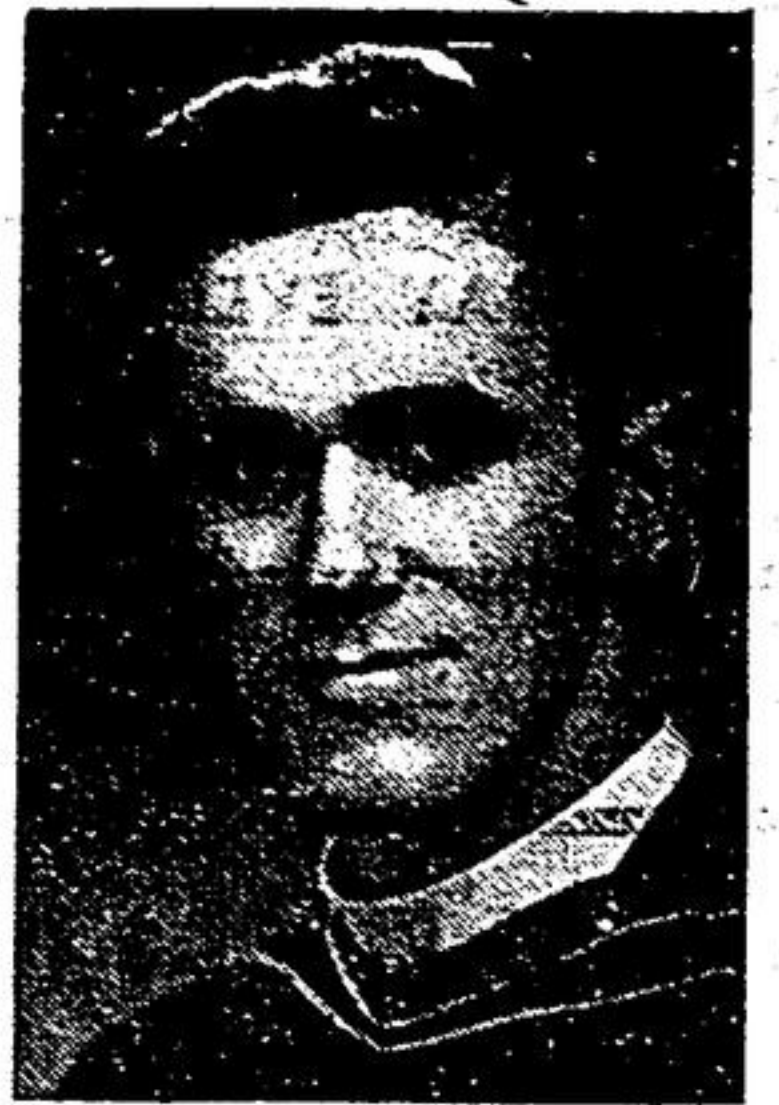
Joseph Cadieux

Passes in 92nd Year

Following an attack of bronchial pneumonia, Mr. Joseph Cadieux passed away in the Stouffville Branch Hospital in his 92nd year. Born at Sutton, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Cyrille Cadieux, in the year 1891, the deceased was manager of a hardware store in that town and later took over the station agency for a time. Following his term of railroad work, the late Mr. Cadieux took a position with the Immigration Department with offices in the Parliament Buildings, Toronto. It was his job to find employment for immigrants following their arrival in Halifax.

In 1909 the deceased purchased a farm on the ninth concession of Pickering and with the exception of a short stay in Florida he has called Stouffville his home for the past thirty-eight years. Before retiring he was employed with Ratcliffs when they had their store in the west end of town and later worked at their present establish-
