Pickering Township Council at a special meeting last week prepared for the annual nomination and election with the passing of the election by-law and appointment of deputy returning officers and poll clerks. The date for nominations has been set for Friday, Nov. 21st, with the election, if necessary, on Monday, Dec. 1st.

Court of Revision on the assessment roll will be held on Oct. 29th and if necessary on Oct. 30th at the hour of 9 a.m.

Constable Masters was instructed to collect the unpaid dog taxes which the assessor reported amounted to 200 unpaid dogs.

Council was advised that the Municipal Board is giving tentative approval to 50 acres of land for Canadian General Electric for zoning. Mr. Melville Grant, solicitor also advised that the municipality will require a new zoning bylaw to exclude undesirable industry.

Fire Area No. 1 of the township represented at the meeting by Messrs. Wells and Comport was given permission to purchase a separate fire-fighting unit. The new outfit will carry 2550 gallons of water and is being purchased from the Sun Oil Co. for \$2,000. An additional \$1,600 is required for other equipment.

Ring up another for **MAGIC!** **GINGERBREAD DESSERT RING**

Mix and sift 3 times, 1 1/2 c. once-sifted pastry flour (or 1 1/2 c. once-sifted hard-wheat flour), 2 tps. Magic Baking Powder, 1/2 tsp. baking soda, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon, 1/2 tsp. ground ginger, 1/2 tsp. grated nutmeg. Cream 1/2 c. butter or margarine and blend in 1/2 c. lightly-packed brown sugar; gradually beat in 1 well-beaten egg and 1/2 c. molasses. Combine 1/2 c. buttermilk and 1/2 tsp. vanilla. Add dry ingredients to creamed mixture alternately with liquids and spread batter in greased 8" angel cake pan. Bake in rather slow oven, 325°, about 50 mins. Serve with hard sauce which has been flavored with grated orange rind. Yield: 6 servings.
