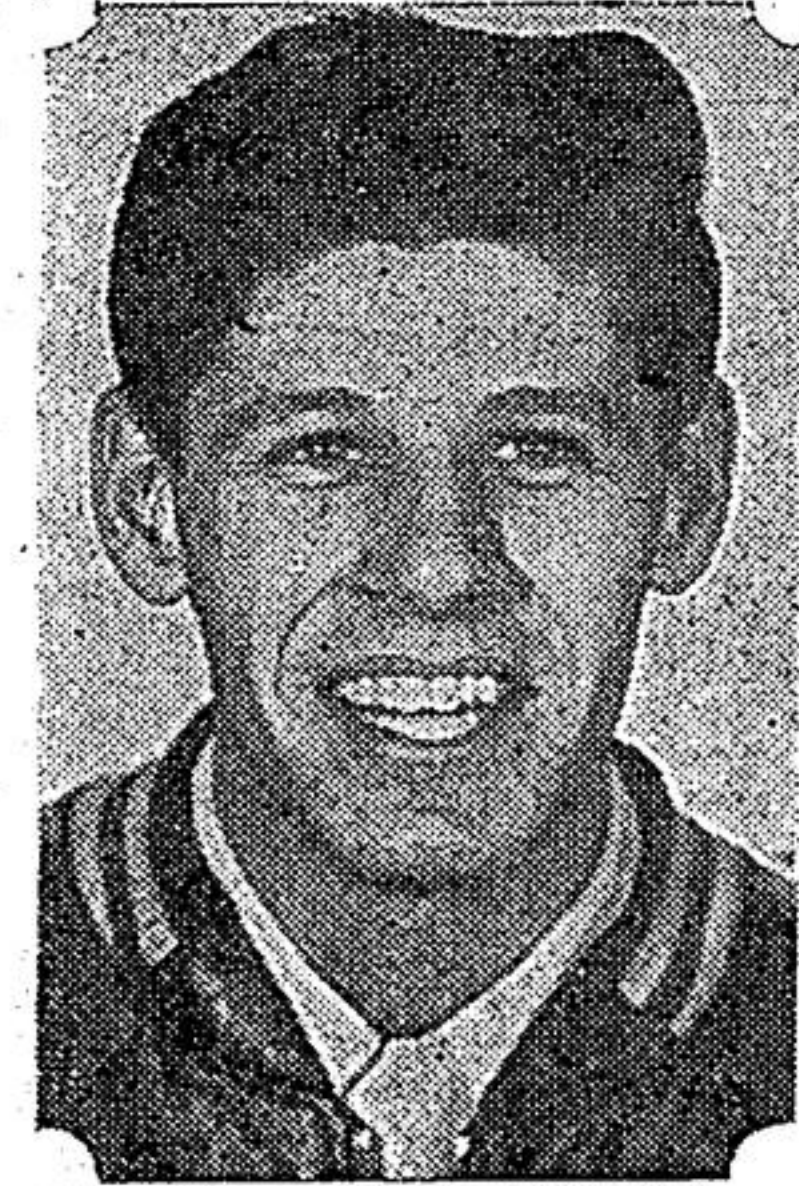

Clippers Move into Orillia Sat. Night for League Opener

On Saturday night of this week, the Stouffville Clippers, Senior 'B' Champions of last season, move to Orillia for the first game of their schedule. The local squad will no doubt find the Terriers a much-improved squad over last year under the coaching eye of ex-Newmarket star Al Shewchuk. The Clippers have been practicing constantly for the past three weeks and it is hoped that they will be able to match the opposition of the group. While some of last year's players have decided to play their hockey in other centres there will be a number of new faces to help fill the gap made vacant by their absence. For the goaltending position it is expected that both Norm Stunden and Blake Etougar will be available. The two regular defence pair with the club last year, Jim Machin and Herb Rose will be back along with two newcomers in Gus Chard, a star with Weston Senior 'B' squad, and Mac Clement who played with Ayr Raiders in the Scottish Hockey League for the past two seasons. Up front coach Bob Bangay will centre a line along with other regulars Ronnie Bell, Geo. Stark, Nick Bangay, Frankie Stephenson, Hal Gibson, Polly Minton and Jack Watson. Gord Lewis, a favorite with the home fans and last year in the Scottish Hockey League will also add considerable strength up the centre. In the many practice sessions some of the regulars have shown top-notch condition with plenty of fight and drive.

The Orillia-Stouffville game will probably be broadcast over station CFOR on Saturday night. Those who find it impossible to make the trip north can follow the Clippers by turning their dials to this station.

Future Hockey Stars Flock to Lions NHL

Over 70 Lads Turn Out
In the early hours of Saturday morning while the majority of residents were still enjoying the comforts of bed, dozens of young lads with skates and hockey sticks slung over their shoulders headed for the Stouffville Arena on bicycles, in cars or on foot for the opening sessions of the Stouffville Lions Minor Hockey League.

For the first hour over seventy players worked out the kinks in their legs and arms before the young lads could be sorted out according to age and divided into teams. Boys ranging from 13 years to under 15 by Dec. 1st were selected and split into equal squads as were players from 11 to 13 and 8 to 11. The six teams were given a half hour of hockey each with every boy having plenty of time to join in the sport. Coaches Albert Smalley, Bill Mulholland, Jim Thomas and John Davis were on hand to offer their services assisted by Ted Edwards, the Chairman of the Boys and Girls Committee of the Lions Club.

The club representatives were pleased to note the number of new arrivals at the arena on Saturday morning with young lads from almost every community in the immediate district taking advantage of the opportunity to play hockey. For the next twenty-five Saturday mornings and as long as the arena is in operation for hockey during the season all young fellows between the ages previously mentioned are asked to meet at the arena by 8.30 a.m. A special meeting of the coaches is to be held on Thursday evening of this week to group the players into four balanced teams and a schedule will be drawn up shortly.

Juvenile Entry In Four-Team Group

At a meeting held in Aurora on Monday night a four team group was arranged including Stouffville, Newmarket, Aurora and Richmond Hill. An additional entry may be forthcoming from Woodbridge. The league is to be run according to OMHA rules with each team to supply an official when playing both at home and away. A list of the players and their ages is to be turned in by Dec. 15th. It is hoped that the schedule will commence by Nov. 15th.

Richmond Hill, who are contemplating an entry, will be without ice until January but will play a number of away games until natural ice is available. Any teams who wish to make an entry into the OMHA must file an application form by Jan. 15th. Woodbridge, although equipped with an artificial ice plant, are yet without a playing surface because of ice-making failure. Aurora is hoping for a couple of exhibition games with the regular schedule gets underway.

Unionville Arena Shows \$4,000 Profit

At the annual meeting of the Crosby Memorial Community Centre at Unionville last week the financial report was presented showing an operating profit of \$4,000.27. Chief revenue producer was the renting of ice time and playoff games of outside clubs which netted the arena \$7,692.23. The Toronto Hockey League contributed \$3,338.72, and the Curling Club paid \$2,582.85. Public skating revenue amounted to \$2,260.35. Free time contributed for children's skating was valued at \$1,632.40.

Heaviest operating expense was the hydro, an account of \$3,463.06. The original bank loan amounting to \$25,000 is still being carried on which interest was paid of \$1,247.88. The principal has been reduced by \$500.

Orillia Downs Lyndhursts 5-2

A rough battle in which 19 penalties were meted out, inaugurated the hockey season in Orillia on Saturday night as the Terriers defeated Toronto Lyndhurst Motors, 5-2.

The Terriers unveiled some potent Senior 'B' talent in Bruno Favero, Ab Bowen, Clary Payne and defenseman Al Pearsall. Bowen was the scoring ace with two goals and an assist.

In the second session, a ruckus that started with Hank Pearsall and Toronto's Vic Sluce exchanging words in the penalty box, broke into a free-for-all. When order was restored, Pearsall and Sluce each had 10 additional minutes to serve and four other penalties were handed out.
