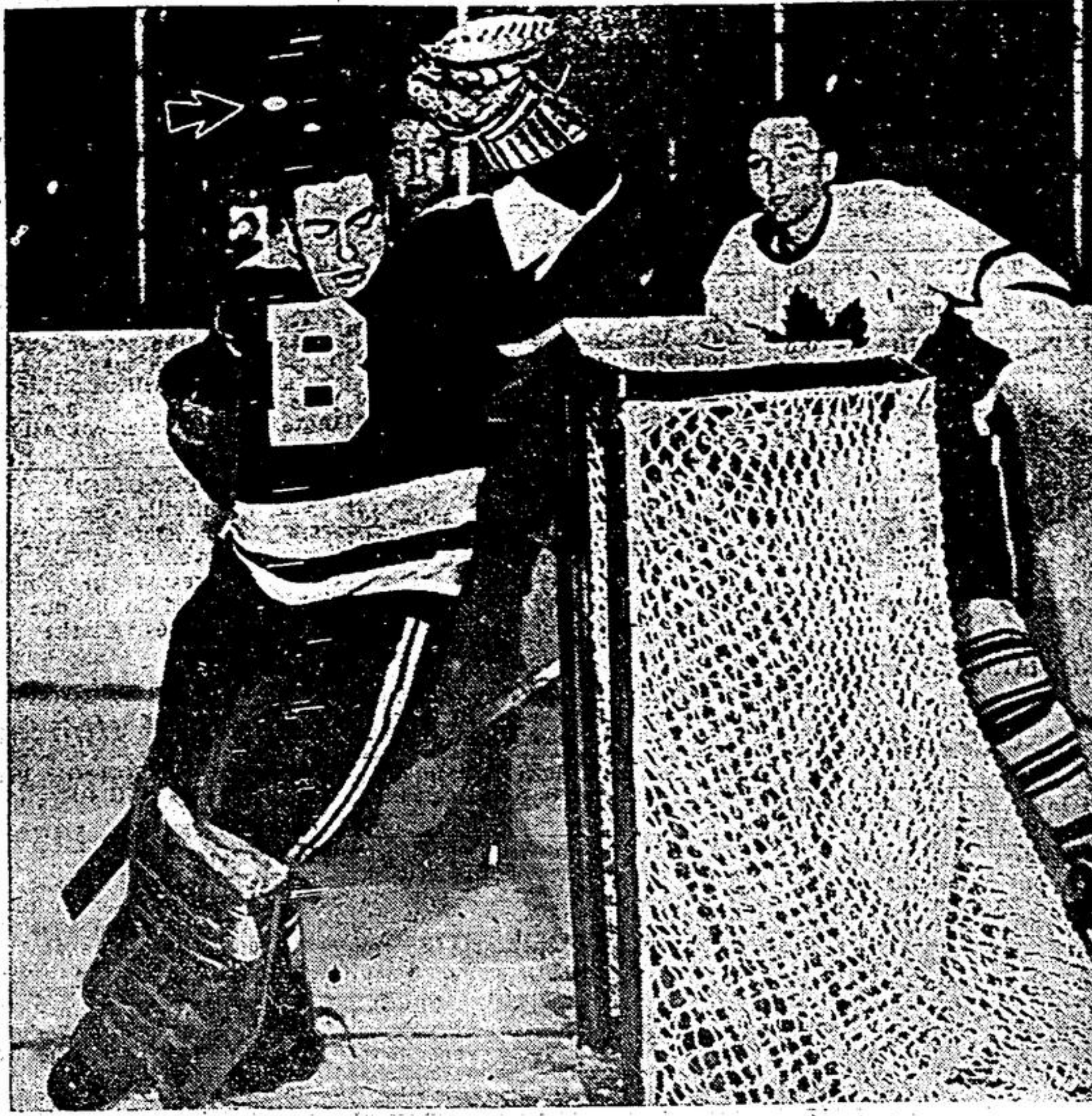

## Clippers Down Orillia 4-1 In Senior Hockey Opener

Stouffville Clippers started their 1952-53 Senior 'B' schedule on the right foot by downing Orillia Terriers 4-1 in a rough and rugged contest on Saturday night. For the first minute of the opening period the Terriers swarmed all around the Clipper net and peppered one shot after another at goaltender Blake Eatough only to be stopped cold on every attempt. With the Terriers playing wide open hockey, coach Bob Bangay grabbed a loose puck at his own blue line and raced in with Stephenson on the Orillia net. The Clipper centre-star deked the lone defenceman out of position and flipped the rubber to Stephenson who blinked the light with a low drive. This sudden setback increased the efforts of the Terriers, who bore into the attack with reckless determination. Play became very rough at this point as players on both sides rocked one another with stiff body checks. With G. Lewis of the Clippers serving a two minute penalty A. Bowen, rugged Terrier forward, was sent spinning when hit by Nick Bangay at centre ice in one of the hardest checks to be handed out in the entire game. The Terriers continued to press until Bowen slapped in McCrone's rebound to tie the score. Both clubs went scoreless for the remainder of the period.

The Clippers took over complete control of the second period and kept the Orillia goaltender Ross on his toes during the twenty-minute session. With but forty seconds remaining in the period Gord Lewis and George Stark worked the puck over the Terrier line to set Stephenson up alone in front of the net. The Clipper scoring star made no mistake as he sank the puck in the corner.

The feature fight of the night broke out midway through the second period when Herb Rose and Rusty Aikens tangled along the boards. The rugged Stouffville rearguard lashed out with a Marciano right that sent Aikens reeling to the ice. As the Terrier forward came back for round two, Rose changed his tactics and hurled his opposition to the ice with a Yukon Eric headlock. Each player received major penalties with an additional two minutes being tacked onto the Clipper defenceman.

Play opened up in the third frame as the Terriers tried desperately to get back on even terms. B. Bangay received a tripping penalty in the early minutes of the period and during that time the Orillia attackers failed to get a direct shot on the net. E. McCrone, who was outlucked time and time again around the Clipper net, had the best chance of the night to tie the count as he cruised in on the goal alone but defenceman Herb Rose came out of nowhere to break up the play.

Hal Gibson put the Clippers two goals up when he broke free from centre ice and although Orillia's Ab Bowen was breathing down his neck all the way he failed to overtake the speedy winger. Two minutes later George Stark raced in on Ross in the Terrier cage and after pulling Davison on the Orillia defence completely out of
