3 Hurt, Damage \$30,000, Mulock Fire

Two firemen were hurt when a wall collapsed and a third was burned by hot tar as volunteer fire departments from Aurora and Newmarket fought a \$30,000 blaze which destroyed a three-car garage Sunday on the W. P. Mulock estate.

Buried under a pile of bricks as the wall of the garage caved in, Newmarket firemen Dennis Bosworth, 30, and Joseph Jeat, 38, were rescued by other firemen. They were taken to York County Hospital in a provincial police cruiser and treated by Dr. Gordon Cook. Beat required eight stitches and Bosworth four stitches for head cuts.

Aurora fireman Thomas Rank was splashed in the face by hot tar from the ceiling of the garage as he attempted to get closer to the flames with a hose line. He was treated at the hospital for severe burns.

By connecting two hose lines, 15 firemen under Chiefs Harry Jones of Aurora and James Coltham prevented the flames from spreading to the Mulock home—stead 250 feet away and another garage 50 feet away.

Two autos, a station wagon and farm implements were destroyed. Farm manager Lloyd Croser was awakened by the smell of smoke and saw flames rising from the garage.

A heater may have caused the fire, said Chief Jones.
