## Markham Mother Saves Three Children from Fire

A 24-year-old mother braved flames and choking smoke to rescue three of her five children Thursday after fire broke out and gutted their one-story frame house in the southwest section of Markham village.

Mrs. Peter Descouteaux made two successive trips into the burning building to save Rickey, 3, and Paul, 2, after a spark from an ironing cord plug ignited insulation shavings in the wall of a laundry room. She pushed Joan, 5, out the door after phoning a neighbor to call the fire department.

Mr. Descouteaux, an employee of Massey Harris, Toronto, was at work and the two oldest children, Ronald, 6, and Carol, 7, were at school.

Mrs. Descouteaux made a third attempt to enter her blazing home to save some of the contents, but flames and dense smoke drove her back. Loss is expected to exceed \$9,000. The house was only partially insured.

Hamppered by smoke and lack of water facilities, Markham volunteer firemen were forced to use masks before they could enter the burning building. Two pumper trucks had to make two trips to refill their tanks, and firemen battled the blaze more than an hour before bringing the flames under control.
