Gordon G. Cross, a resident of Pickering Township for the past two years, will seek a councillor's seat at the next municipal election to be held on Dec. 1.

With a wish to promote a better administration in Pickering, Mr. Cross will fight for the stabilization of farm taxation with a possible reduction of taxes, adequate recreational facilities for Pickering youth, the establishment of a south sub-municipal office for convenience of the residents in the south section of the township and a complete public announced statement of assets and liabilities now held and owned by the township.

He will also support the Police Commission and will do everything possible to have the secondary educational costs taken over 90 per cent by the Provincial Government. He is in favor of the Dept. of Highways maintaining and repairing the roads between highway 2 and 2A and he also favors plans to provide lake water for residential and industrial areas of Pickering.

He supports the move to have tax payments broken into three equal installments for both residential and business taxpayers.

Mr. Cross is a married man with two sons. He has been a real estate broker for six years and served with the RCAF overseas for four and a half years. He was educated at the York Memorial Collegiate in Toronto and he later attended a Cincinnati Ohio College.

Peter Chapman, 11-year-old resident at the home of Mr. D. Watts on the 5th concession of Uxbridge, was the subject of an intensive search on Friday evening. The youth, whose home is on 76 Trandy Ave., Toronto, decided to hitch-hike into the city. 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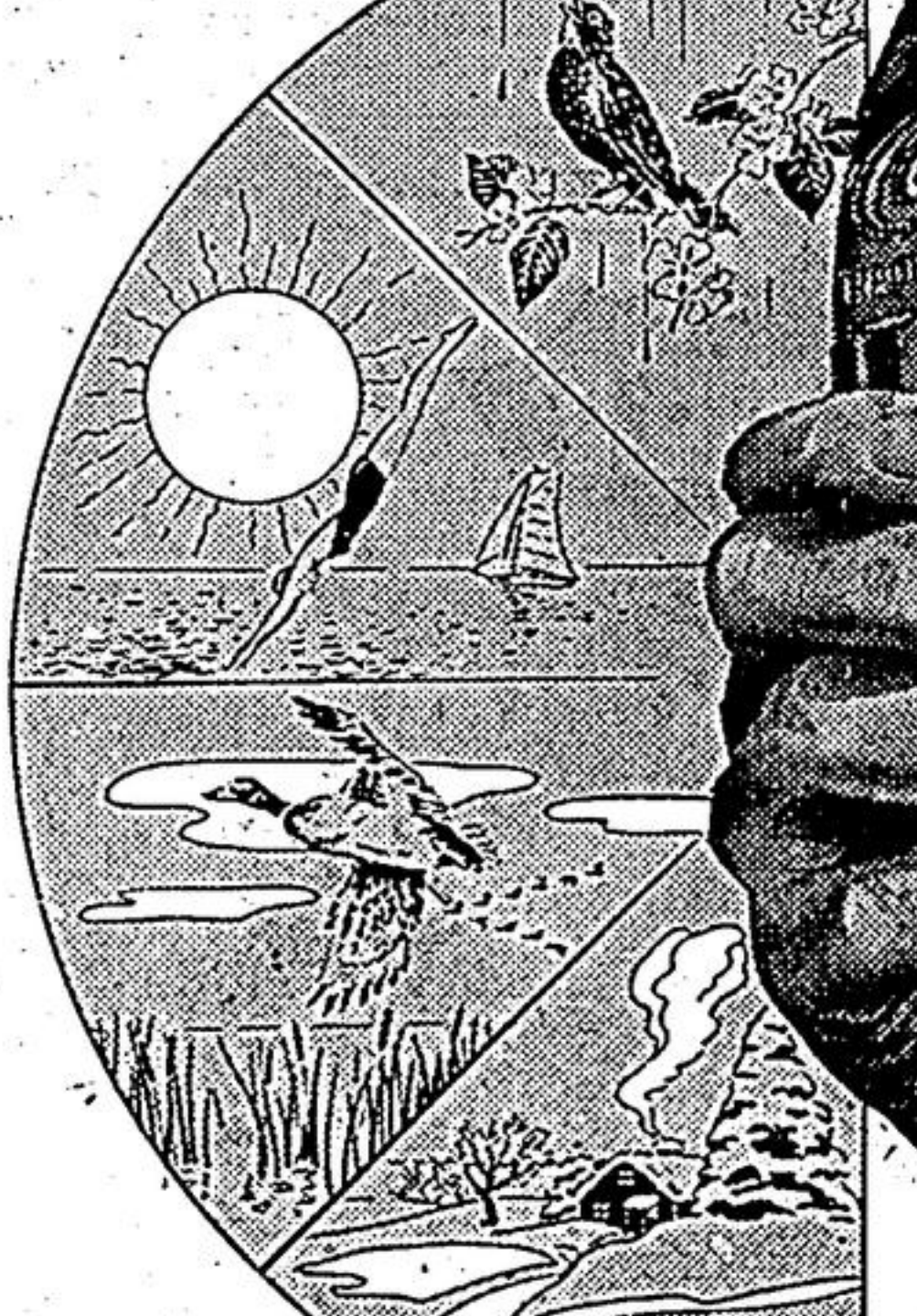
