World Championship Match a Possibility For Canada in 1953

Wide interest, stimulated in by the tremendous success of the "International" plowing matches under the direction of the Ontario Plowmen's Association, is likely to result in the holding of a "World Championship" match in 1953 at which representatives of many countries are expected to compete.

Following the second annual British Ploughing Association match to be held at Falkirk, Scotland, on Nov. 12, at which Ontario will have two entrants, plans for the creation of a match on a world-wide scale will be furthered. Up to the present seven countries have associated themselves with the Provincial Governing Board which has set up the necessary machinery and tentative rules for the contest.

Of particular interest to Canadians is the fact that there is a strong possibility that the first world-wide match, will be held on Canadian soil.

Mr. J. D. Thomas, former County Match Chairman, and well known conservationist, has been appointed by the Ontario Plowmen's Association to represent that organization at the world conference. Mr. Thomas will extend an invitation to the governing body to hold the first "world" match in Canada.

A conference on the proposal to set up the world-wide match was held in England last year and the following nations were represented on the provisional board, in addition to Canada: England, Scotland, Wales, Eire, Holland and Sweden. During the discussions a provisional set of rules was drawn up to govern the match. The rules have been tentatively accepted by these coun-

tries. The tentativé rules, under which the match will be held, will have a trial run during November's British Ploughing Association match, a special "overseas invitation class" being included

for the purpose. With the expectation that the first world match will be held next year Mr. Thomas intends to bend every effort to have Canada made the scene of the historic occasion.


