The last game which he handled for Stouffville was a Junior OHA playoff some seven years ago, when the local Red Wings of that day were in the playoffs with Gananoque at Kingston.

Kingston Edged Clippers 6-5 In Thrill-Packed Speed Show

Kingston Goodyears scored their second straight victory over the Clippers here on Saturday night in a see-saw battle that was in doubt up until the final whistle. At one time in the game, the local squad held a 3-1 advantage but the speedy Kingston crew fought right back to pull up on even terms and go on to win on a lone third period tally by winger Geo. MacGregor. In the final stages of the contest, Referee Red Farrell handed out three penalties to the Goodyears and while playing with a man advantage the Clippers did everything but put the puck in the net. At one time there were players piled three deep in front of the Kingston cage but the puck stayed out. At times we thought that Johnson in the visitors net must have a couple of concealed horse shoes around his neck as the elusive disk rolled by the open corner time and time again.

Aitken opened the scoring for Kingston after but thirty seconds of the first period when he slapped a rebound by Eatough when the Clipper rearguard failed to clear the loose puck. Jack Watson tied the count less than a minute later from Stark and Bell in a smooth three-way passing effort.

Gord Lewis put the Clippers in the lead at 2:05 when he deflected Gus Chard's blueline drive into the corner. A penalty to the Kingston playing coach, Watts gave the Clippers an opportunity of lengthening their lead but although the local forwards showed the puck at the Kingston net, they failed to find a loophole. Polly Minton had a good chance to break into the scoring when he trapped a loose puck inside the Goodyear blueline with N. Bangay in the penalty box but his hard drive was batted aside by Johnson in the Kingston cage.

Midway through the period, Nick Bangay flew through the entire team and in spite of falling heavily into the end boards he struggled to his feet and tipped the puck into the twine. Not to be outdone the visitors roared back with two tallies to even the score. Ken Partis and Doug McKeown were the goalgetters.

McKeown put Kingston in the lead at 3:10 of the second period but Stephenson evened the score four minutes later in a wild scramble around the Goodyear net. B. Bangay and Gibson picked up assists on the play. At 12:05 playing coach B. Bangay drilled a back hand shot from the faceoff through the pads of the surprised Kingston goalie to put the Clippers out front for the second time in the game. Before the period ended however Myke blinked the light from MacGregor after Eatough had stopped three shots in a row.

The third and final session saw MacGregor notch the lone and all important goal to give his team the hard fought victory. Although the Clippers came back strong to carry the play for the remainder of the period it just wasn't their

night to win. Both G. Stark, J. Watson and F. Stephenson missed what appeared to be sure goals in the closing minutes of the game. In spite of the loss, the Stouffville squad showed that extra power and speed that carried them to the Senior B championship last year.
