Soil and Crop Improvement Meeting

Sir Andrew Jones, head of the British Food Mission to Canada and Dr. George D. Scarseth, Director of Research, American Farm Research Association, will be two of several outstanding speakers who will address the annual convention of The Ontario Soil and Crop Improvement Association, A. H. Martin, Secretary-Treasurer of the Ontario Association announced this week. Mr. Martin is Director of the Crops Branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture.

The convention, which opens on Tuesday, January 20th to January 23rd, will hear discussions on many phases of farm problems. Outstanding officials in Canadian Agriculture will discuss the application of the latest developments in agricultural research. Farmers who have pioneered in new methods and practices will give the convention the benefit of their experience.

As part of the deliberations of

the Potato Section of the convention Kris P. Bemis, internationally known potato authority at Washington, will address the gathering.

Programme of the convention, in addition to the Potato Section, on January 20th, calls for a meeting of the Seed Growers section on the same day.

General sessions of the association will be held on January 21st and 22nd. The Turnip section will hold its meeting on January 23rd with the Northern Ontario section meeting on January 21st at 8 p.m. in the King Edward Hotel.

Ontario Farm equipment dealers will present the newest in agricultural machinery during the period of the convention, with the Ontario Junior Farmers Machinery Club day being held on January 22nd.

The annual banquet will be held at the King Edward Hotel, on Thursday, January 22nd.

The general convention programme is designed to give prominence to field and soil management practices which aid in increasing the productivity of the soil.

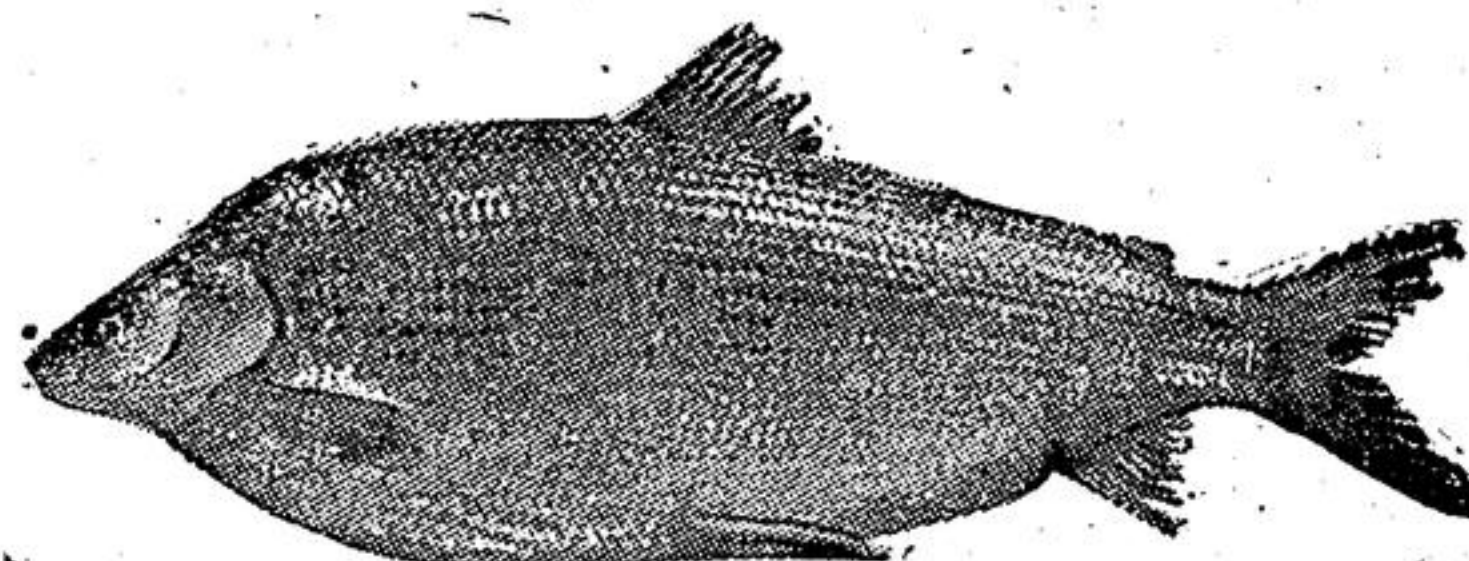
