Extra \$1.00 on Drivers' Licenses For Claims Fund

The Honourable George H. Doucett, Minister of Highways, announced recently that effective with the issue of 1953 chauffeurs' and operators' licenses an Unsatisfied Judgment Fund fee of \$1.00 will be collected from each person to whom is issued a licence. The increase is made necessary by reason of the fact that the fees collected during the current year have not been sufficient to meet the demands for payment out of the Fund. "During the current year it has been necessary to secure an advance from the Provincial Treasurer to meet current payments," said Mr. Doucett. The Fund must be self sustaining and as an increase in payments out is anticipated for 1953 the necessity for increasing the fee is obvious. No portion of the fees paid into the Fund is used for administration purposes.

In making the announcement Mr. Doucett pointed out that while the Highway Traffic Act provides for the collection of a fee not exceeding \$1.00 yearly, no fee was collected during the first two years the Fund was in operation and since then but fifty cents has been collected annually.

The Unsatisfied Judgment Fund was established to provide relief for persons, who having suffered damage which was occasioned by

a motor vehicle, are unable to recover remuneration for the losses sustained. The inability to recover may be by reason of the fact that the motorist, who caused the damage, is unable to pay the judgment obtained against him, or because the identity of the vehicle which caused the damage cannot be established.

That the Fund is meeting the purposes for which it was intended is evidenced by the fact that to date over \$3,000,000. has been paid to innocent victims of traffic accidents who would have been unable to collect damages from any source had the Fund not been in operation. Many heart rending cases could be cited where the breadwinner of the family having been killed, the widow and fatherless children, through payments received from the Fund, were materially assisted over the trying period of readjustment. Of this total over \$140,000. has been paid for damages for death or personal injuries arising out of so-called "hit and run" accidents.

Mr. Doucett emphasized that the Fund affords protection in many cases where a compulsory insurance law would offer no protection, i.e., where damage resulted from the operation of an out-of-province financially irresponsible and uninsured motorist; or a so-called "hit and run" driver. He also pointed out that somewhat similar laws have been adopted in the following provinces and states: British Colum-

bia, Alberta, Manitoba, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, Newfoundland, North Dakota, New Jersey (effective 1955).

In not one of these jurisdictions does the legislation offer all of the benefits provided under the Ontario law. Some do not provide for recovery in "hit and run" accidents. Others provide for payment of judgments for personal injury only or set a minimum for property damage.

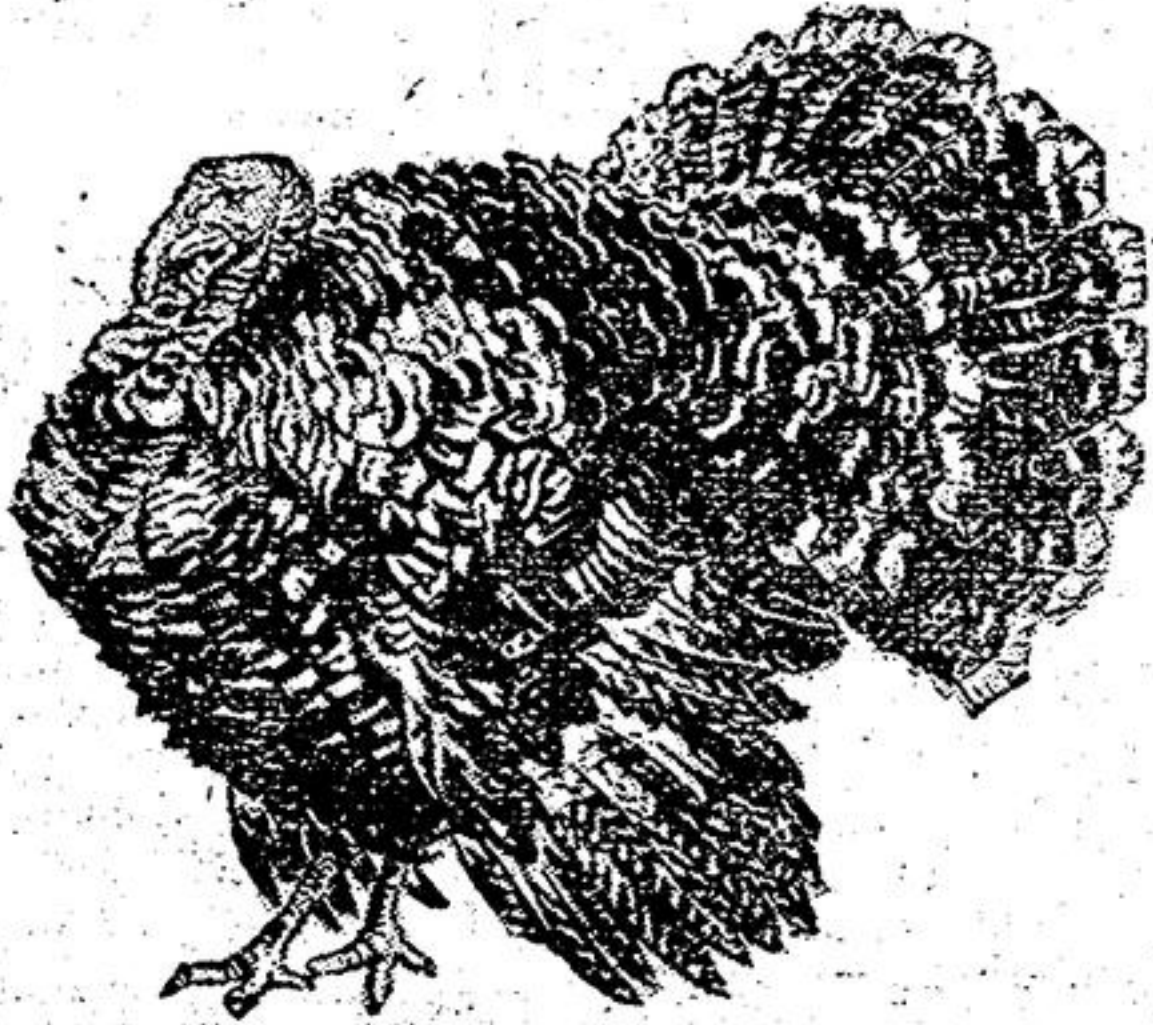

NOTICE TO ONTARIO MOTORISTS

Re Unsatisfied Judgment Fund Fee

Notice is hereby given, that pursuant to the Highway Traffic Act and effective with the issue of 1953 motor vehicle operators' and chauffeurs' licenses, an Unsatisfied Judgment Fund Fee of \$1.00 will be collected from each person to whom is issued a 1953 license.

This increase in fee is required in view of the fact that the 50 cent fee heretofore collected has proven to be inadequate to meet the demands for payments out of the fund. Since 1947 when the fund was created payments out have exceeded \$3,000,000. During the current year it has been necessary to obtain an advance of \$300,000 from the Treasury Department in order to make the payments required. A further advance will be required to meet the payments anticipated before the end of the fiscal year (March 31, 1953).
