Purchase of School Site is Completed - Plans Will be Scutinized by Department

Tentative approval has been received from the Ontario Municipal Board to proceed with the erection of the new Stouffville High School. The tentative approval which is a customary procedure, and has already been received for a similar school at Markham, allows the local High School Board to complete the purchase of the school site, ten acres on the Lambert Stouffer farm, and the architect to draw up sketch plans. These plans are then presented to the Dept. of Education for scrutiny and possible modifications, after which blue prints are proceeded with and tenders called for the construction.

Shore & Moffatt, local architects, have already drawn the sketch plans and these will be presented for Department approval very shortly.

The local Board is proceeding with all haste, in order that full construction may be underway this coming summer, and it is hoped that some savings may be attained should the same contractor obtain both the Stouffville and Markham jobs.
