Mrs. Cornelius Wuis, another occupant of the house, was bathing her baby when the crash occurred.

"I saw the glare of the car lights and thought the house was on fire," she said. "I snatched the baby out of the tub, wrapped him in a blanket and ran to the door. I certainly was relieved when I saw the house wasn't on fire."

Rowe escaped injury in the crash but a passenger, Norman Duchene, Montcalm Drive, Toronto, was cut about the face when hurled against the windshield.
