Pickering District Farmers Discuss Spring Bacon Show

The annual meeting of the Ontario County Hog Producers' Association was held in the town hall, Beaverton, with 150 hog producers in attendance.

The possibility of holding a Bacon Hog Show in connection with the Ontario County Seed Fair in Uxbridge on March 14th was discussed. It was decided to have a Bacon Hog Show if the necessary arrangements can be made.

James Clark, Atherley, R.R.2, was the winner of the attendance prize. The prize was a purebred Yorkshire gilt.

The chief speaker of the afternoon was Chas. McInnes, president of the Provincial Hog Producers' Association. Mr. McInnes pointed out that the United Sales Agency Ltd. had been appointed to handle all hogs sold in the province of Ontario. This United Sales Agency is made up of all the Live Stock Commissions firms who are operating on the Ontario Live Stock Yards at the present time. Mr. McInnes pointed out that the price of hogs was to be arrived at by agreement between the Sales Agency and the hog buyers. The Sales Agency has the power to direct hogs to the highest bidder.

Grants of \$50.00 each were voted to the North and South Ontario Federations of Agriculture.
