Farm Meeting Favoured Half Mill Levy for Federation

The Whitchurch Federation of Agriculture held a panel discussion on agriculture problems last week at Vandorf. There were nine participants, leaders from farm organizations in York County. Mr. Charles Hooper presided as chairman of the panel.

Mr. Bert Palmer explained the financing by farmers of the new farmers' market at Thornhill. He said that more farmers' markets would be a benefit to consumers and farmers alike. Mr. Frank Marmit spoke on school areas. He believed school areas gave the rural children the benefit of more efficiency in school management.

Mr. Charles Grube said that Farm Forums were a group of people in any community that came together to study for community and self-improvement. Mr. James Hope asked why there was a continuous demand by consumers for a low milk and farm produce price, while other prices remained at a high level.

Mr. Fred Wicks told how the Cream Producers Association was trying out a new packet or wrapper for butter. Mrs. Reid Brumwell touched on York CoOp medical services. Mr. John Sytma explained that the territory rate on car and truck insurance was according to the amount of traffic and accident in any territory. He believed that the increased traffic caused by a drive-in theatre in Whitchurch Township might possibly raise the territory rate.

Mr. Frank Brumwell stated that in Markham Township when the farm land was exempted from fire and police taxation on 100 acres.
