Growing Orchids

The Weekly Tely of Jan. 31st, 1953, featured a valuable article on orchids with colored illustrations.

Humidity is a prime necessity. Place small gravel in a tray or other wide container, invert a flower pot or flower pot saucer in the gravel, place the pot of orchids on the inverted pot, and keep the gravel moist. Don't let the pot of orchids stand in water. It is beneficial to spray once or twice a day overhead with a fine spray of rain water. If the sun is shining, Orchids can be grown in a sunny window from November to March, partial shading is advisable the remainder of the year.

Some say plants should be watered once a week, some say twice or more; but it probably depends on the humidity and type of heating system in your home. Probably a very small amount of rain water each day is as good a general rule as any—the main object is to keep the fibre damp.

Osmunda (fern) fibre or osmundine is "jammed" into thick pots instead of earth for growing orchids, in order to give the roots access to air and water, provide necessary elements of plant food, and give support to the plant. As our plants came already potted, we haven't experienced the transplanting hazards. Roots overhanging the edge of the pot make you feel you should cut them off or tuck them under some earth.

Mr. Wylie tells in his article of particular orchid plants on a particular tree limb for 25 years in Mr. Fennell's Orchard Jungle, "never touched by human hand, watered, debugged or fertilized."

Potted mature plants run from \$5 up, with smaller type orchids selling for less. It may seem expensive, but not when you consider you'll receive a dividend of flowers for years.

If you're prepared to give it the specific care it requires, buy an orchid plant. The thrill you'll experience in seeing its exquisite blooms open in your home will make you say (with apologies to Joyce Kilmer) "Only God can make an Orchid."
