EDITOR'S MAIL

Mr. Taxpayer of Markham Tp. Below is a copy of a brief the writer submitted to council on March 2nd, 1953. Please urge your local representatives to take some action before it is too late.

Mr. Reeve and Members of Council:

It has been recently announced that the Municipality of Greater Toronto would extend to the southern borders of Markham Twp. This will present many a new problem for our council. Unless we immediately take some definite steps to plan for the future, it is my opinion that farming in Markham Township will become virtually impossible, because of high taxation and the low income property owners may have difficulty maintaining their homes. It is possible to be in the same position as Toronto Township now is in.

Over a year ago, we formed a planning board to present a master plan of developments, but I haven't heard anything more of this.

If we continue to build new schools at our present rate and have no industrial assessment to offset the additional burden of taxes certain sections of Markham Township could be financially embarrassed.

We cannot continue to have an administration which in my opinion spends most of its time in indecision.

I would like to make a proposal that this council approach the villages of Richmond Hill, Stouffville and Markham and Scarborough, and ask if they could supply us with water for lands adjacent to their villages. If so, they could make a profit on the sale of water and we could open up various tracts of land for small industries who do not require sewage. It may mean we would have to raise debentures to pay for the pipe line but this investment would be repaid in a few years, as any business must invest money to make money.

If our present planning board is to continue on, I feel that it must either do something definite to prevent a situation to arise such as I have described, or council should bring in outside expert planners and be prepared to pay the price.

All of which I respectfully submit.
