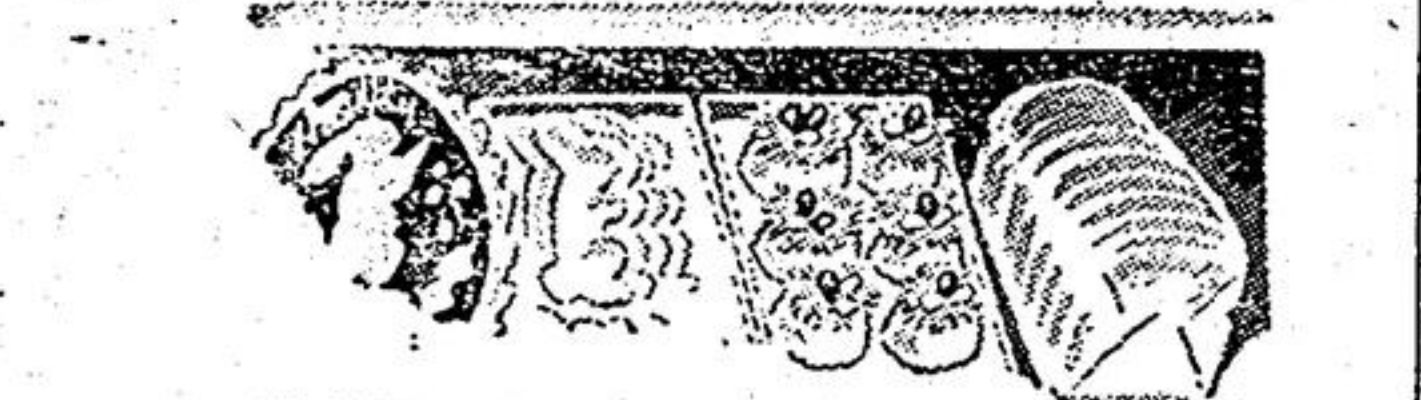
We extend sympathy to Mr. and Mrs. F. Billingsley in the death of his mother who passed away at Barrie last week.

Officer Coming Here Resigns OPP

At least 17 constables have resigned from the Ontario Provincial Police force recently and 15 more have threatened to turn in their uniforms unless they receive assurance this week of pay increases. Among those leaving the Force is William Dewar of the Thornhill detachment who was to have taken over duties in Stouffville this week.

Mass resignations by officers are reported imminent across the province. Many constables are known to be seeking jobs with better remuneration.

It was learned at Queen's Park no boost in pay is likely in the near future. But an increase in yearly increments has been given approval in principle by the Attorney General's Department. This would bring OPP men to maximum pay for their categories in three years. Those, however, who have reached their maximum would not benefit.

The increased increment has been held up by technicalities. Four officers quit Monday at Thornhill detachment; five resigned recently at Oakville, five at Mount Forest, three at Whitby. Four others are expected to announce their resignations at Whitby within the next two days. Five will quit at Port Credit unless they are assured of pay boosts by Wednesday, they say. Six more at Thornhill are looking for other jobs.

Three of the four who have quit at Thornhill are Constables Malcolm McIntyre, William Dewar and E.

W. McBrien. Resignations from the Oakville detachment so far are: Constables George Green, Bill Daniels, Ed. DeMille, Harry Wilson and William Smith. Green is now a security guard at Ford's new factory at Oakville, where the pay is \$3,600 a year. Current pay of an OPP constable is \$2,860 annually, or take-home pay of \$50 weekly.
