### Many Changes in "W.B.'s" Corner



Many changes have transpired in this, the former W. B. Sanders residence, one of the most prominent corners in Stouffville a half century ago. Many will recall the fine lawn and fence which surrounded this corner property where now stands the W. G. Garrett Garage. The outward structure has been little changed, but the interior was made into a multiple two-family dwelling some years back. W. B. Sanders, the name by which this brick home is most familiarly known, settled in Stouffville over eighty-five years ago, coming to Canada from Devonshire, England, in 1861. In 1875, the records show, he was deputy-reeve of Whitchurch and served the Village of Stouffville as reeve for seven years. He was Warden of York County in 1887 and a Justice of the Peace. He also served the community as Postmaster for more than a quarter century.

Today the house is occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Jas. Austin and the Joy Beauty Salon operated by Mrs. Austin. Mrs. Austin, Mr. and Mrs. Alan Boadway live in the rear apartment.

### Grasses, Legumes Good Silage Crops

Grasses and legumes may be ensiled in either chopped or uncut form.

Points to remember about uncut silage are:

1. Long grass for silage may be handled in the field with the regular farm equipment such as mower with swathing attachment or mower and siderake and hay loader.
2. The buckrake may be used to handle 1½ to two tons an hour at distances up to a third of a mile.
3. Using method No. 1 requires considerable labor and becomes costly when large tonnages are involved.
4. Uncut crops may be stored in horizontal or pit silos only.
5. Silage losses are greater

for uncut silage.

6. Uncut silages are harder to take out of the silo than cut silage.

Here are the points to remember about chopped silage:

1. The crop may be brought to the silo in uncut form and put through an ensilage cutter.
2. Where more than 200 tons are required it is most economical to use a forage harvester as it provides the lowest cost per ton and the least amount of labor.
3. Chopped forages are easier to unload, spread and compact than the uncut crop.
4. They may be blown into any type of silo. It is not necessary to have silage heaps on the side of a hill or level ground as with uncut silage. They can be put in the conventional upright silos.
