Farmer in Pickering Twp. for 32 Years

A Pickering Township farmer for 32 years, William Edwin Redman, 79, died at his home in Ferris Township, near North Bay, last Wednesday, after a long illness. The funeral service took place from the Robinson Funeral Chapel in Brooklin conducted by Rev. W. Whitmore. Burial was in Salem cemetery.

Mr. Redman was born on Scugog Island, a son of the late Elizabeth Rheder and William Redman. He was educated in Pickering Township schools and established a farm a short distance west of Whitby on the townline road. He was actively connected with the Methodist and United Churches.

Surviving are, his wife, the former Emma Young of Uxbridge Township; one son, Clarence of Hamilton; four daughters, Mrs. Harrison Newell (Edna) of North Bay; Mrs. Roy Parrott (Elva Marie) of Churchhill, Ont.; Mrs. Iver Kingdon (Bertha) of North Bay; Mrs. Alice Peister of Brighton. Ontario Potato Committee Makes Recommendations

Convinced that the interests of both the grower and consumer can best be served by the production of a quality product and by the adoption of proper packing procedures, the Potato Committee of the Ontario Soil and Crop Improvement Association is asking that regulations be established under the Farm Products Grades and Sales Act that will necessitate the use of new bags for the packing of Fancy and No. 1 grades of potatoes.

The Committee, at a recent meeting held in the Parliament Buildings, not only unanimously favored the use of new bags but also urged that the size of the bags to be used be set out in the governing legislation. The necessity for "proper tying" of the bags was also stressed.

Reporting on the campaign of recent months to check grades, Douglas E. Williams, Chief Inspector of Farm Products, told the Committee: "Results have been amazing—buyers, retailers and consumers have reported a marked improvement. All favor a continuation of our campaign."

The Committee was informed that since the first week of January there have been 212 detentions involving 41,615 packages, over half of which were 75 lb. bags and much of the remainder ten pound size.

Some reasons for detentions were as follows: mechanical injury 106, pitted scab 53, surface scab 38, no markings 28, dry rot 67, underweight 21, wire worm 7, improperly marked 6.

Plans for a master Potato Growers competition on a province-wide basis were also discussed by the Committee. Awards will be made on a basis of point value as follows: 300 for yield of marketable potatoes; 150 for exhibit of one bushel; 100 for interior color and 100 for dry matter content.
