Former Telephone Manager Passes In 80th Year

On Wednesday, April 15th, Mr. James W. Kennedy, a resident of Ringwood for the past eight years, passed away in the Stouffville Nursing Home at the age of 79. Born near Stayner, the son of Mary Weir and Henry Kennedy, the deceased was employed as a salesman with both the Ford Motor Co. and the Oliver Plow Co. in Toronto and later joined the staff of the Bell Telephone and became manager of the Agincourt exchange. Mr. Kennedy held this position for 35 years until his retirement in 1915 due to failing health. For his lengthy service at Agincourt Mr. Kennedy was classed as a Bell Telephone Pioneer. While a resident of Agincourt he attended Knox Presbyterian Church but since moving to Ringwood he worshipped at the Christian Church.

Besides his wife, the former Mabel Pringle, the late Mr. Kennedy is survived by one son Harry in Toronto and one sister, Miss Nettie Kennedy, of Agincourt.

Funeral service was held at the parlors of L. E. O'Neill, Stouffville, on Friday afternoon at 1:30 p.m. conducted by Rev. G. Brown of Ringwood Christian Church with interment in Mount Pleasant Cemetery.

TOWN LANDMARK LOCATED AT EASTEND
 What is left of the former Globe Hotel and a Stouffville landmark, still stands at the eastend of town immediately opposite Tenth St. south. Built prior to incorporation which was 75 years ago, the Globe Hotel, long since reduced to a residence, was one of two eastend hotels, the Yake establishment being immediately opposite. In its heyday, the Globe Hotel stretched almost to the present eastend store. Long low sheds with their accompanying dance hall above, were all part of the scenery there. The place was operated by Ed. Williams, later by Jake Stong and following local option coming to Stouffville, reverting again to the Williams family. The place was most recently occupied by Effie Kester who passed away recently and the house is closed for the present. One remaining sister in the family is Mary (Mrs. McMonagle) of Detroit, Mich.
