Plan Markham Tp. Coronation Holiday

Councillor W. L. Clark reported to Markham Township Council on Monday evening that a public meeting with the Unionville Village Trustees, and other organizations had been held and plans laid for the celebration of Coronation Day. Markham Village, he stated, as well, had plans underway. The celebration in Unionville which would be held in conjunction with the township would take the form of a parade with sports in the park. Committees have been set up and a band is to be secured, he reported. Council agreed by resolution that Richmond Hill should be empowered to issue debentures for \$12,000 to cover the cost of a six acre public school site at the northend of Richmond Hill for a new union school. A grant of \$25 was agreed on for the York Musical Festival. This was an increase of \$10 over previous grants. Clerk Chas. Hoover reported that a new sub-division was being opened by the Rouge Development Co., partially within the township and partly within Markham Village, and the promoters of the plan were anxious that council should go on record as not opposing annexation of the parcel of land, which is near the Fair Grounds, with Markham Village. Council was of the opinion that the request should come from Markham Village before committing themselves.
