Markham Self-Styled Artist Paints For Charity Fund



Tully Barton, self-taught artist, has had a rough time keeping alive for the past 35 of his 69 years, but hardship and physical disability have taught him compassion for those in worse straits than himself.

With a heart that may stop any time and supporting himself on a \$60 a month pension, he has no money to spare for people he wants to help, but he has thought up a method of helping them anyway.

Leaside Lions Club agreed to place one of Mr. Barton's pictures on display at their carnival during the week of June 15. Tickets will be sold on the painting, with a draw to select the winner the end of the week. All proceeds will go towards the Lions charity work.

Tully was slow getting started on his lifelong ambition to be a painter, mainly because he was too busy making a liv-

ing or too ill to do much of any-thing.

But for the past two years he has spent every waking hour painting scenic canvases. It is one of these that he hopes to auction.

Born at Campbellford, Tully saw his first artistic effort—a crayon drawing of Christ—exhibited at the Elmvale Fair when he was 10. When he was in his early teens the family moved to Buffalo and a few years later he passed up an art school.

Instead, he toured Western Canada and the U.S. working at odd jobs, then in a steel plant at Buffalo for a while. Later he moved to Cobalt.

In 1916 Tully joined the Canadian Army and acquired the heart condition which has plagued his life ever since. He was invalidated back to Canada in 1918.

For 10 years he lived as best

he could. Veterans' Affairs officials did not consider his illness serious. He got no pension at first, but after 10 years the Government reconsidered his case and he was put on the pension list.

Until 1945 he worked at odd jobs throughout Southern Ontario. Then he went to Christie Street Hospital until he moved to Markham and built a two-room cottage on the Rouge ravine.

"I knew that if I didn't start painting full-time right away, I'd never realize my ambition," he said. So, once the cottage was built, he settled down to steady painting.

"If a man goes through life and is no benefit to anyone but himself, what kind of man is he? Until now, I haven't been of much use to anyone. I've only got a few years left and I'd like to make good use of them."
