### Norman Toole Was Ardent Sportsman

On Friday, April 24th, Mr. Norman Toole passed away in the Stouffville Nursing Home in his 70th year. Born in Midland, the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Toole, the deceased resided for nearly three years at Camp Borden and later in Toronto where he has lived for the past eighteen years. The late Mr. Toole had been in failing health for the past two years. In his younger days he was an enthusiastic sportsman and acted as trainer for the Midland hockey team for a number of years. He was also an ardent fisherman during the summer months on Georgian Bay. A skilled machinist by trade, the deceased was employed with the Connaught Laboratories in Toronto as a stationary engineer. He is survived by his wife, the former Mary Ann Travis, one son, Mr. J. L. Toole of Stouffville, and a daughter Laura (Mrs. G. Eagles).

Funeral service was held on Monday afternoon in Christ Anglican Church, Stouffville, conducted by Rev. F. Bourne with interment in Stouffville Cemetery.
