The funeral will be conducted from the Giffen-Mack Chapel on Danforth Ave., on Friday morning at 11 a.m. with interment in Mt. Pleasant Cemetery.

Carl Boynton Vice President of Ontario Jr. Farmers

Honour has again been brought to the York County Junior Farmers by Carl Boynton of Woodbridge when he was elected Vice President of the Junior Farmers' Association of Ont. at their Provincial Conference and annual meeting at the O.A.C., Guelph, April 26th to 28th. Mr. Boynton, who has served as County Director for the past two years, is a Past President of his own Vellore Club and was County Vice-President two years ago.

In 1949 Carl won the coveted Chicago Trip to the 4-H conference having attained a high score in livestock judging. Calf and Grain Clubs and outstanding participation in Junior Farmer activities. Two years later, he was selected as one of four boys to represent Ontario in an international livestock judging competition in Great Britain.

Carl was a member of the York County Grain Club team which won the Provincial competition and stood second in the national contest. His interest in crop improvement work was recognized by the County Crop Improvement Assoc. which he has served as director since 1949 and this year, at 23 yrs. of age, is President. As a Junior Farmer representative to the Royal Winter Fair, he has been a member of the Seed Committee for the past three years. He took time off from these duties to represent the County in the Inter-County Livestock Judging Competition in 1952.

Carl is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Russell Boynton of Woodbridge whose farm is on No. 27 highway, just below No. 7, where they are developing a fine herd of Holsteins and growing registered seed.

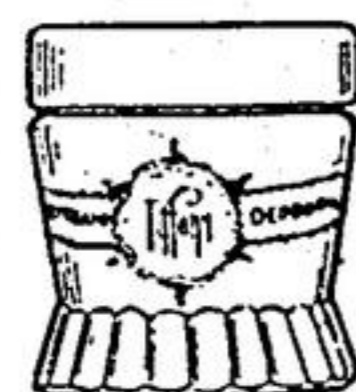
