J. W. Powers To Represent CCF

J. W. Powers, an Oshawa alderman, is the CCF party federal candidate in Ontario riding. Employed in General Motors and part-time fruit farmer, Ald. Powers succeeds Roy Scott of Seagrave who recently withdrew from the race due to the pressure of farm work.

Scott was the party's standard-bearer in last year's by-election and was renominated again last fall when it was believed a spring election was in the offing. With the date of the election still unknown, Mr. Scott felt he could not devote all his time to a campaign when farm work was at its heaviest.

Ald. Powers is a native of Ontario County, having been born in Port Perry in 1905. He served two years on the East Whitty Township Council. The CCF candidate has a family of four, three children attending high school. Powers was nominated by Mayor John Naylor of Oshawa at the convention which was held on Friday.

Charge Pickering Pair with Seized Booze Fiasco

Pickering police officers, testifying before a police commission inquiry in Whitby on Friday, charged Sgt. Fred White with "drinking up evidence" in his cruiser, and a former Pickering councillor with partying on police-raid beer.

The Commission headed by Judge F.J. MacRae, was investigating reported shortages of liquor and beer from the Pickering police station following a complaint from the local Canadian Legion branch.

The commissioners heard testimony that Fred Zinkie, a Pickering councilman in 1951, had once phoned the police office and asked that a case of beer be sent to his home. On another occasion, they were told, Sgt. White seized a bottle of rum from a parked car and drank it with a fellow officer in their cruiser.

Pickering police chief Lockhart Trinnell admitted to the members that he had never kept records of seized liquor because "I didn't know I was supposed to."

He could not explain the disappearance of seven cases of beer, part of a lot seized during a raid on a Legion hall, but admitted the evidence had been "stored" for nearly six months on the porch of his house.

A letter from the raided Legion branch to Pickering council complaining that they had never received a receipt for the seized beer from the brewer's warehouse brought about the investigation.

In testimony on Friday a warehouse official said he had no records of any liquor ever being received by him from the Pickering police force.

OPP Sgt. Charlie Hefferon who searched the police station on orders from the Crown attorney, reported he could find only a small portion of police-tagged beer and whiskey. Pickering police made more than 45 liquor raids in the past three years.

Sgt. Fred White, who claimed to be a teetotaler, emphatically denied ever drinking in his cruiser or having liquor sent to his home as his brother officers testified.

"I have a physical condition such that if I drank any alcohol I would die," he said.

Dan Dand, a former constable told the commission he had personally taken a case of beer to Sgt. White's home at his request.

"There were a number of prominent Pickering people there and also a police sergeant," he said.

Dand also testified he was with Sgt. White when the sergeant seized a bottle of rum from a couple in a parked car and he and White drank it in the cruiser.

Const. Dave Freeman of the Pickering force told the court when he had first heard of the shortages he questioned Sgt. White about them.

Freeman said Sgt. White told him: "There has been a large quantity gone for a considerable time but you have

nothing to worry about".

Suspend Top Policemen

Following the above revelations, Pickering Police Commission suspended Chief Lockhart Trinnell and Sgt. Fred White, the two top officers on the Pickering force.

Judge F. J. MacRae, head of the three-man commission, said administration charges would be laid against the two men under the the police act. Their duties will be assumed by Provincial police officers.
