The drive from London to Epsom was once made by carriages, mule carts and farm wagons. It was a grand day — a wonderful spectacle of scenery, grandeur and Royalty. We watched the face of the Queen as her horse was beaten. She sat with her mouth partly open, hoping to the last but beaten by four lengths.

## Langstaff Farm May Revert To Jail House

The Province plans to return two former jail farms to Toronto within five years, Health Minister Mackinnon Phillips said last week.

The properties with total acreage of 990 acres, are at Langstaff and Concord. They were leased by the Health Department 10 years ago for use as mental hospitals.

Dr. Phillips announced preliminary plans for one or more new mental hospitals with 1,500 beds that would more than make up for the loss of Langstaff and Concord. Site of new hospital has not yet been decided.

"While nothing can be done in the immediate future," he said, "the Department of Health is anxious to make these two properties available to the city of Toronto, if possible, in the next five years."

The Province leased the properties for \$1 a year and paid the taxes between \$2000 and \$3000 a year in the case of the Markham farm. They housed mental defectives, all males, in the middle and older age groups. Inmate population at Langstaff is about 420, Concord about 80.

Dr. Phillips indicated the exact date these properties would be returned to the city would depend on the progress of work on new accommodations. As soon as space for the 500 Langstaff-Concord inmates is available, they will be moved to the new building and Langstaff (600 acres) and Concord (300 acres) will be available for Toronto's use.

Dr. Phillips and Dr. N.C. Montgomery, mental health director for the department are working on detailed plans for the new building, including selection of the site.

The new hospital will house the same type of inmates as those at Langstaff and Concord, Dr. Phillips said. Its completion is expected to give the Province all the accommodation it needs for mental defectives.

While modern treatment is expected to cut down on the number who become seriously ill mentally, Dr. Phillips pointed out that no such advances had been made for the mentally defective.

These inmates have a low natural intelligence that makes it impossible for them to look after themselves. Some of them, however, may be considerably improved by modern training methods.

The city set up Langstaff and Concord as jail farms shortly after World War I. Short-term prisoners were sent there—men to Langstaff, women to Concord—instead of being kept in the Don Jail or sent to provincial reformatories.

Since they became mental hospitals, at a time when crime was at a low ebb in World War I, all prisoners have gone either to the Don or to reformatories. In a report last December, following the Boyd gang escape, Judge Ian Macdonnell rapped overcrowding at the Don and named this as one factor contributing to the escape.

## Poison Ivy Ruins Holidays

With vacation time in full swing and the old swimming hole a current attraction, now is the time to guard against that destroyer of many a happy holiday, poison ivy or if you insist, Rhus toxicodendron.

Under either name, contact with the plant can cause much misery and seriously blemish what you hoped would be a care-free period of relaxation.

Poison ivy might be called a contact poison. You don't have to eat it to suffer from it. You only need to touch it. Maybe after walking through a patch of poison ivy, you will become infected by unlacing your shoes. Itching, rash and small water blisters are the symptoms. A severe attack may put the victim in bed, a mild attack will cause considerable discomfort. Treatment should be under the direction of a physician, if possible. Where this is not possible, application of a potassium permanganate solution to the affected parts is recommended. This solution consists of one 5 grain tablet of potassium permanganate in one quart of water.

Poison ivy is found in a variety of locations, roadsides, parks, country lanes, woods. It frequently occurs along the edges of fairways where your golf ball rolls. The partly wooded banks of a favorite trout stream often supports a good growth of poison ivy, and it is also found in the wild blackberry patch. But don't avoid these summer haunts, just avoid the poison ivy. It is easily recognized. It may be a vine or a low bushy shrub, but whatever the growth habit it always bears three shiny drooping leaflets. Pale white flowers, and small white berries complete the picture. The following lines have more merit than for their descriptive accuracy, but they do help to remember the danger signs.

Berries red, have no dread  
Berries white, poisonous sight  
Leaves three, quickly flee.

Poison ivy can be eradicated by proper use of such weed killers as Ammate, Atlacide, 2, 4-D, or 2, 4, 5-T. Applications may be made from June to September.

A pamphlet, "Poison Ivy" published jointly by Ontario Department of Agriculture and Ontario Department of Health gives a complete description of the plant, methods of treatment of victims, and eradication of the weed. It is obtainable from either of the Departments.

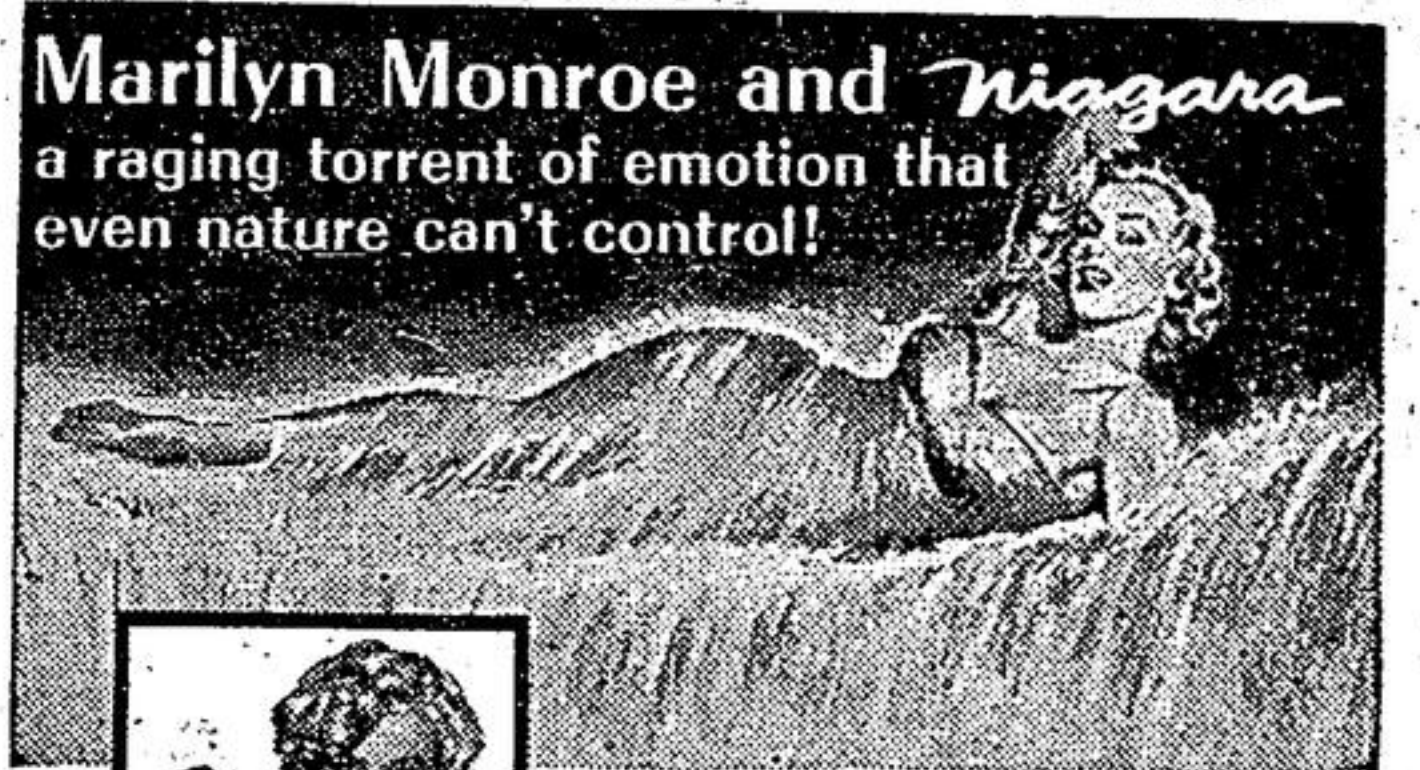
