He said the platform called for the supremacy of Parliament when the Opposition had had opportunities to discuss legislation "ad nauseam" and "debate to their heart's content."
It was a good thing, he said that Canada had a stable government and one that was "the envy and admiration of foreign countries."
Seated behind Mr. Pearson on the platform was Miss Lois Webster, his first grade teacher when he lived in North York riding.
He reminded her and his audience that at one time he was "mascot on an Aurora baseball team when my father played centre field."
